## **Introduction**

This is the fourth draft of the Michigan encased catalog, with 841 pieces listed. The first draft came out in the summer of 2000, with 305 different pieces listed. The second draft came out in November, 2002 and had 651, including 197 Detroit pieces. There were four cities all grouped together, vying for second place: Flint in the lead with 24, Dearborn and Grand Rapids with 23 and Lansing with 22. As discussed below, I count as different pieces when different dies were used, either obverse or reverse, but not when the same dies contain multiple year cents. I sent out third drafts from 2002 through 2025, but called the catalog Fourth Draft when I agreed to speak to the Huron Valley Numismatic Society in April 2026 and the new version of the catalog will be then given to all members.

That second draft was published by Mich. Tams as a supplement to the Juke Box and sent to all members in the summer of 2003. There are still some copies floating around, sometimes appearing on eBay, and someone was trying to sell one on Amazon for \$29.95.

There are still many Michigan pieces not listed, although new Michigan pieces come on much less regularly than New York or Ohio, the other states I catalog. I am now certain that there are likely at least 1000 different Michigan pieces and my best guess is that the final total will be in the neighborhood of 1200 or a bit more. For some reason, watching auction catalogs and eBay sales, there just do not seem to be as many Michigan encased pieces as there should be, compared particularly to New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois. Minnesota seems even worse in terms of a fairly large state with very little encased production.

This is essentially the same introduction that I wrote for the Ohio encased catalog, with minor changes based on Michigan specific matters. If you have not read the Ohio catalog, I hope you find this introduction interesting and informative.

## **Introduction to Encased Generally**

I will begin in this introduction by giving a very brief overview of encased coins. More details are available in several TAMS articles on encased by Michael Kolman, Bryan Ryker, Joel Reznick, Jim Hemphill and me. Of particular interest is Bryan Ryker's 1995 eighty page article and catalog of Fankhauser encased, with updated version coming out in 2025, each still available from TAMS or Bryan. Much more information is available in issues 1-28 of the

Casement (all issues available from me), the quarterly publication of the Associated Collectors of Encased (ACE), founded in 1995 and folded in 2003. There also was an internet club, Encased Collectors International, at [www.encasedcollectorsinternational.org](http://www.encasedcollectorsinternational.org), which produced a series of newsletters and other articles and information, some of which is still available on the Internet. Bruce Perdue in 2026 sends out a newsletter to a list of encased enthusiasts.

Encased coins began in 1899. There were very few encased made in 1899, a few more in 1900 and then an explosion of encased came in 1901. Encased have been made in every year since. There was a second explosion of encased in 1946 following the war and then a very large number of encased produced throughout the 1950s. Less encased were produced in the 60s and still less in the 70s, 80s and 90s. In the early 2000s, I believe that only around 10-20 encased were made in any year, if that many, but then when the Penny Press Mint started making encased pieces in 2005 and ECI worked to generate interest, more pieces have been made in the mid 2000s.

Most encased are made out of aluminum. Indeed, the explosion of encased was made possible when aluminum became a cheap and abundant metal in the 1890s. Encased are struck by a die, with the cent or other coin placed in the middle of the planchet just prior to the striking. It is the strike that places the coin firmly in the encasement.

Before we start the catalog, we need to get some terminology straight. The side of the encasement with the advertisement or description of the event is generally called the obverse of the encasement, because that is the side that is of the most interest to collectors of encased. The side with the good luck message is called the reverse. There is no general consensus in the hobby as to what to call the aluminum part of the encasement, but I have seen and will use either “encasement” or “holder.”

In most encased coins, the obverse of the coin faces the side of the encasement with the good luck message, which as you now know from the previous paragraph is the reverse of the encasement. The reverse of the coin faces the advertisement side of the encasement. My best guess is that this is so because the good luck message side was the top die, called the hammer die, while the advertisement was the bottom or anvil die. Thus, when the operator naturally inserted the coin heads up into the blank encasement for striking, the encasement’s reverse die matched the coin’s obverse. For this reason, in almost all of the cases where the encasement dies are not aligned, the cent is properly oriented with the reverse of the encasement.

In a very few encased, the cent is rotated in position as to the holder. This would only occur if the operator was indifferent to the position of the cent or made a mistake on an individual encasement. Some encased that often come with rotated cents are noted in the catalog. However, because it is rare that a cent is rotated, if the cent is not oriented to the encasement, this is a warning to check a piece carefully to determine if the cent is indeed the genuine original cent struck with the encasement.

## **Cataloging method**

The Michigan encased cataloged here are listed under Michigan cities, alphabetically. I have continued to use the cataloging number method from Bryan Ryker’s 1995 TAMS article, where he gave numbers to the 600+ Fankhauser encased, including forty-six (46)

Michigan encased. There is some controversy in the hobby on this, as many prefer to use the cataloging system that has been used for many years for tokens. Indeed, if I were starting from scratch with the first published encased catalog, I would use a different numbering system. However, I believe that Bryan's method is one of a number of possible reasonable methods and I have used it in the interest of conformity.

The catalog number is given first. It consists of four items: (1) the state, (2) the city, (3) a two letter code for the merchant or event, (4) followed by a two digit number, or on very rare occasions a three digit number. For all these encased, the state is Michigan, "MI." The city is a three letter description, usually the first three letters of the city unless there would be two or more cities with the same designation, such as Grand Haven (GRH), Grand Ledge (GRL) and Grand Rapids (GRA), or where a city like "Kalamazoo" (KAZ) just has to have a "Z" in the designation. If parenthesis are around the state or the city, it means that place's name is not on the piece itself and has been attributed or inferred. Review the discussion on mavericks below to see how that is done.

A two letter merchant or event description follows. That is usually the first two letters of the merchant advertising on the encased or the event. If an individual is listed, such as Mike Casey, then I use the first two letters of the individual's last name. Look for the Mike Casey Used Car piece under (MI)-DET-CA-20, not -MI-20. The same is true if Associates or Sons, or some other description follows. Thus, Jane E. Condit Associates is under NY-NYC-CO-10, not JA-10, and J. Weng & Sons is under MI-MCI-WE-10, not JW-10. However, if a full corporate name is given, then I will catalog the piece under the first two letters of the business, even if that is someone's first name or initials. Thus, look for the F.B. Melin & Co. pieces under (MI)-(DET)/(WAR)-FB-10, et seq. and not under ME-10.

If there is both a merchant and a product advertised, then I usually use the merchant. For example, there are many encased pieces across the country where a shoe store also lists the type of shoes it sells. Those are listed under the merchant. An example is Jerome's Shoes, a merchant from Detroit, who sold Pro Tek Tiv Shoes. Look for that piece under "JE" and not "PR."

When there is a salesman and a company on a piece, I will use the company for the catalog number if I believe the address on the piece is the location of the company. I will use the salesman if I believe the address is that of the salesman. If I have no way to tell which is true, then I will assume the address is the company's location. For example, the John Ryan, Priscilla Ware, Saginaw pieces are cataloged under RY for Ryan and not PR for Priscilla Ware, because the Saginaw address is Ryan's address and not Priscilla Ware, which is a brand name of the Leye Aluminum Co., located in Kewaunee Wisconsin.

Souvenir pieces are under "SV" and exposition pieces are under the first letter of the exposition followed by an "X" for "Exposition." I do not know of any Michigan Exposition pieces.

The two digit identification number that follows starts with -10 and goes up by tens for different merchants and by twos for the same merchant. Room is being left to add new numbers when new pieces are discovered. Generally, the older encased receive the lower numbers. I have kept the same catalog numbers for the Fankhauser pieces that already have published catalog

numbers, so that in those cases where an earlier merchant has the same first two letters as a Fankhauser merchant, the Fankhauser piece will still have the lower number.

After the catalog number comes the date, followed by shape and size. The coin is a U.S. cent unless otherwise noted. The metal of the holder is aluminum, unless some other metal is described. “/” separates lines on the piece; “//” indicates that the writing has gone from above to below the cent and “\” means turn the piece over. This is also consistent with Bryan Ryker’s method, not universally accepted in the hobby.

In the drafts of this catalog, I have felt free to change the catalog number from one draft to the next to correct mistakes and to make the -10 catalog number an earlier date than the -20. I feel free to do this as the catalogs are only “drafts.” Once I am comfortable enough with this catalog to call a version the “First Edition,” then thereafter the catalog numbers will remain the same and I will work around the current numbers when new pieces are discovered.

Shape abbreviations:

RD = round, followed by diameter in millimeters, if known

RD-O = round, off center cent

H = horseshoe (will be noted if holed top or bottom)

SH = squat horseshoe (1901 type where the bottom is cut as opposed to curved) The squat horseshoes all have the patent date, “Pat. Apr. 11, ‘99” at the top of the reverse, between the KMA and the NGB. I do not list that information on each piece. The April 11, 1899 patent referred to on the squat horseshoe piece is U.S. design patent no. 30,516, for an “Advertising Medal.” It was issued to John C. Bean of Lexington Massachusetts. Almost all the SH pieces have 1901 cents, although some have 1900 and 1902 and a very few legitimate 1903. I know of no legitimate pieces with cents after 1903. See MI-BCR-NA-10 for a description of the three types of reverse dies known for this piece.

H-FOB = horseshoe with fob at top

W = wishbone. The wishbone piece was made by Whitehead and Hoag Company of Newark, N.J., and that company’s signature is on all pieces, unless weakly struck and worn off. It was the subject of design patent no. 34,523, dated May 21, 1901, invented by Albert R. Lache and assigned to the Whitehead and Hoag Company, both of Newark. There are no legitimate dates known of the wishbone shape after 1901.

B = bell

CP-R = chamber pot hole right (as viewed from obv.)

CP-L = chamber pot hole left (as viewed from obv.); made by Geo. H. Jung & Co. out of Cincinnati, as evidenced by the signature on many of these pieces (see (OH)-(CIN)-CH-12); a 1913 piece had the signature of Wright (OH-CIN-KI-10).

Reverse abbreviations --

APFOM	--	A Pot Full of Money
GWCS	--	Good When Caught Short
GLKMAP	--	Good Luck/ Keep Me and Prosper
GWBASD	--	Go Way Back and Sit Down

\* is used in the description of pieces to indicate that there is some doubt about the word, letter or number used, either because of unclear reporting, or because the only sample piece available was too worn in that spot.

### **Victory Reverse**

The Victory Reverse is the reverse made in 1945 to celebrate victory in WWII. Victory is at the top. V-E Day May 8 is in a scroll at the bottom left, V-J Day Sept 2 is in a scroll at the bottom right and World/ Peace is at the bottom middle. This is the type 1 Victory Reverse. There is another reverse without the scrolls and with “Year” at the bottom instead of “World/Peace” but I know of no Michigan pieces with this type 2 reverse (and I am not yet 100% certain that this type 2 reverse is an original, authentic to 1945, reverse).

### **Acknowledgment of the Sources for the Encased Pieces -- without them this catalog would not have been possible**

I would like to thank the many people who took the time to help with this catalog. Without them, the catalog would be much shorter. Some of the entries have been taken from various auction catalogs and some from Internet sales. Except for the most expensive pieces, the mail bid catalogs did not usually contain a picture of the item. In addition, the cataloger would usually just list the important information from the piece and not describe the entire piece, as I try to do here. If there are no slashes in the description of a piece in this catalog, that is because I have not seen the piece and am merely passing on the description from an auction catalog. If anyone wants to follow up on my work, most of these catalogs are available from the TAMS library.

The names of the contributors and the auction catalogs appear below, with the abbreviations that are used in this catalog to identify the source of each piece:

AA -- ACE (Associated Collectors of Encased, founded in 1995 by Jerry Binsfeld) auction  
 ACL -- from the ACE Chevy Listing by Jim Hemphill and Joel Reznick, first published in the TAMS journals of February 1989 and June 1990 and also published in the Casement. Michigan was in Issue 7, February 1997. These entries were not complete and there was no indication as to

the date of the cent. If I have no information on the piece from another source, I have left the entries as they were reported.

AJ -- from the personal collection of Alvan Jones

AM -- ACE Maverick, followed by the ACE Maverick No. in parenthesis. Descriptions of mavericks are published in the Casement and ACE members identify them in subsequent issues of the Casement. Starting in 2004, BP moved his maverick column from the Casement to NTCA, and those pieces are listed under NTCA-M followed by BP's identification number in parenthesis.

ATCO -- from ATCO auction sales (ATCO was the predecessor token club before NTCA), sent to me by Terry Cross, unless otherwise indicated

BC -- Cataloged in Bruce Cox's Catalog of Numismatica of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, published in 1985

BR -- Bryan Ryker's TAMS article on Fankhauser encased (all Michigan pieces have the Earl Fankhauser signature in small letters at the bottom of the obv., not mentioned in the text of this catalog). Michigan was Earl Fankhauser's second state -- there are more Michigan Fankhausers than any state other than Indiana, slightly ahead of Ohio.

BS -- cataloged and sold by Bob Slawsky

CB -- from the personal collection of Carl Bangora

CD -- from the personal collection of Cory Downey

CDG -- C & D Gale pricelist or mail bid catalog

CK -- cataloged and sold by Charles Kirtley

DF -- from Duane Feisel's cataloging of certain types of encased, such as good-for encased, or sales mostly in NTCA's Talkin' Tokens

DG -- cataloged and sold by Dick Grinolds

DL -- from the personal collection of Denis Loring

DS -- from the personal collection of Dallas Shaw

EB -- auctioned on eBay usually with a scanned picture provided

ECI -- listed on the state checklist on the ECI (Encased Collectors International) website -- only for pieces where the website has more information than I had without reference to it

EdB -- from the personal collection of Ed Bawden

EK -- from the personal collection of Ed Karn, owner of Allen's Coin Shop, in Worthington, Ohio

GW -- from the personal collection of George Wean

KC -- from the personal collection of Ken Chylinski

KK -- from the Kurt Krueger Auction #124 closing 8/27/92, selling the Michael Kolman Collection of Encased Coins, reprinted in the Casement, Issues 25-28

JB -- cataloged and sold by Jerry Binsfeld

JF -- from the personal collection of Julius Fazekas

LDe -- from the catalog "Michigan Encased Coins" by Lee DeGood published as a supplement to the June 1995 Mich-TAMS publication, 12 pages single spaced with approximately 420 entries. When I combined the entries to this catalog from December 2001 to May 2002, there were 122 previously unlisted entries that were added, and much additional information. Each item that was

listed in the DeGood catalog is marked here with “LDe” even if there were already multiple other sources, except for the Fankhauser pieces and the maverick entries that I did not use because I did not believe they were correctly or sufficiently attributed to Michigan. If it appeared likely or probable that the attribution is correct, then I have used it and called it an unverified piece. There are some entries, however, that I believe are unlikely to be Michigan pieces or which I believe are more appropriately attributed to other places. In those cases, for those of you who have used the DeGood catalog maverick identifications, I do list the pieces at the end in the Maverick cross reference. Lee’s catalog did not give any reverse information and did not explain any attribution for mavericks. Lee’s work has added greatly to this catalog and I very much appreciate his gracious agreement to allow use of his work.

LS -- from the personal collection of Les LeRoy Smith

MICH-TAMS – Listed or pictured in the Junk Box, the publication of Mich. TAMS

MK -- from Michael Kolman’s June 1988 TAMS Journal article (this is an excellent article and the first article known to me that was published on encased). The pieces referred to from this article were all pictured. The article was reprinted in the Casement, Vols. 8, 9 and 10

MR -- from the personal collection of Mel Reiter

MS -- Miscellaneous -- encased that I have seen (usually for sale)

NP -- Norm Peters, New York token dealer, catalog

NTCA-M -- listed in NTCA’s “Talkin’ Tokens,” Bob Perdue’s maverick column that started with the January 2004 issue, followed by the BP identification number in parenthesis, which is the NTCA issue it first appeared in followed by a number (starting with 1)

OR -- These are the encased purchase order records from the Osborne Coinage Co. Osborne made the Fankhauser encased pieces, and in his research on the 1995 Fankhauser article, Bryan Ryker (BR) was able to obtain their purchase order records from 1949 through 1969. He published them on the Internet in July 2008. That publication represented a huge gain in knowledge as to the number of pieces made and the location of the merchants ordering them. The site went down in 2015 but Bryan resurrected it in 2025 and also took incredible time to make it searchable, so it is very useful. Type [tokenandmedal.org/Osborne](http://tokenandmedal.org/Osborne) into your browser.

PC -- cataloged and sold by Paul Cunningham; the catalogs I have seen are from May 25, 1976 to May 30, 1977 -- or in Paul Cunningham’s stock when I saw it at the August 2003 Cleveland Ohio coin show (listed as PC1), or on his website from later (listed as PC2)

PCMT -- from Paul Cunningham’s Michigan trade token catalog, which listed good for encasements -- dates were usually given for the Lincoln cents but not for the Indian cents. What a coincidence -- the TAMS Journal article announcing Paul’s Michigan Trade Tokens book was the same one that featured Michael Kolman’s extensive article on encased cents, June 1988

PCu -- from the personal collection of Phil Cusumano

PK -- cataloged and sold by Paul Koppenhaver of Granada Hills, California

PM -- from the personal collection or from the book “Lansing’s Money” by Paul Manderscheid, editor of the MICH-TAMS Junk Box in 2000

### **Different Dates and Different Dies**

If more than one date is known for a piece, I list the source of each date, separated by a semi-colon, with the source of the earlier date first. If I can verify that the pieces were struck with different dies, a completely different catalog number is given. If the encased pieces with the different dates were made by the same dies or if I cannot verify that different dies were involved and the dates are close enough together so that it is likely that the pieces were struck at or near the same time, only one catalog number is given. However, where the dates are far enough apart so that I believe it is likely that there was more than one die involved, where there is a difference in price because of a different date or mintmark or where the items have already been cataloged with -A and -B designations, such as the Fankhauser pieces, then I do use the -A and -B designations. The longer I work at this, the less I have to use -A and -B, as I examine more and more of the different pieces.

If the letters on two similar encased pieces do not appear in the same position relative to each other, the two pieces must have been made with two different dies. Dies wear out and have to be replaced. If there is a time gap between strikings, it is possible that the original die has been lost, so that a new die must be prepared. Usually the engraver tries to make the new die as close to the previous die as possible, but never exactly succeeds. The lettering is often just a bit off.

Examining various dies and the dates in the pieces suggests to me that most encased pieces were made with original rolls of the same date and mint marked cents. Thus, on a large series, such as the Gamler series from Buffalo, N.Y. and on the City of New York City of Wonder series, there is not a lot of variation in the dates of cents used with the different dies. It is the rare piece that appears to have been made with a wide variety of cents. Michigan examples include the two National Bank of Detroit ((MI)-(DET)-NA-12 to -14) pieces with a large number of different cent dates.

On some of the "Souvenir of" pieces, the "O" and the "F" of "of" are widely separated. That is what is meant in this catalog by the use of "widely separated."

## **Coin Denominations and Other Things Encased**

By far, the most common thing encased is the United States cent, by many orders of magnitude. When encased pieces started to be made, the cent had considerable value, today it is essentially worthless. Thus, cents were popped out of encasements to be spent in the early years, but no more. There are also encased nickels, dimes, quarters, halves and dollars. Very rare are other things encased, I know of two, magnifying glasses (see NY-ROC-PA-10 and OH-CLE-CU-10, for example) and compasses (see OH-DAY-RA-30 and -32).

## **Holes in Encased**

If I believe that a piece was holed as made, I note that, along with the location of the hole. Unless the hole is very crude, it is sometimes difficult to tell if the hole was added to all of the pieces made or if someone punched a hole only out of the piece in question. This is because the holes were not built into the planchets, but rather were punched out after the piece was manufactured. Therefore, a well made hole by the consumer will look exactly the same as the hole made by the manufacturer. A drilled hole is easy to tell and is what is meant when “crude hole” is used.

## **Pricing -- An Art Not a Science**

I have received comments that readers of this catalog appreciate my giving an estimated value on the pieces. I have tried to do that, even though I often do not have enough information to do anything but make an educated guess. I intend to add more values in subsequent drafts of this catalog.

Where a value is given, it is intended to include a range of plus or minus about 20%. It is not intended to be specific. I could easily put slightly different prices on the same item depending on when I placed the value. Both \$7 and \$8 really only mean a price between \$5 and \$10, and a reasonable sale could even occur slightly outside that range. Unreasonable sales are not all that rare either, as often neither the seller nor the buyer has a good grasp on the value of the piece.

Because of the small market for encased items, pricing can vary substantially. Two people who really want a piece can bid the item up beyond any prior expectations. On the other hand, prices can be very soft if demand drops only a little. Experience on eBay shows that once one person acquires a piece, the next sale can realize substantially less, because one less collector is now bidding on the piece. Values are based on my experience with these and similar pieces and upon auction prices realized.

The value given is based on a nice, problem free EF piece. Reductions should be made for pieces with problems or which are more worn than EF. Pieces with nice cents with luster, particularly nicer Indian cent pieces, are worth more. A nice encasement, particularly an older encasement, with no noticeable marks and no tinpest (graying) is also worth more. The values are only for original, non-replaced coins. If the coin has been removed and replaced, the value drops dramatically, especially among the common pieces. I have written extensively on replaced coins

in my 1999 TAMS article and in the Casement. Keep in mind that the original coin was struck with the encasement. The coin should therefore be in the encasement tightly and cannot be pushed out with pressure. There should be no light showing between an original coin and the encasement. The original coin will lie even with the encasement or under it -- it will not stick out over the encasement. Replacement coins are a particular problem with Indian cents, probably because many of the original Indian cents were removed in order to spend them.

There may well be marks on the coin from its second striking in the encasement. This can include a flattening at the rim, markings made from the encasement die at the edge of the coin and even marks made on the high points of the coin by the pressure of the strike. Unless egregious and detracting, these marks will not reduce the value of the encased piece. In fact, they can enhance it by giving evidence of the originality of the cent as encased. Sometimes, part of the die meant for the aluminum strikes the cent.

### **Maverick Identification**

A “Maverick” is a token that is not self-identifying as to the location of the advertiser or event. The work maverick came from a Texas land-baron and politician, Samuel A. Maverick, who lived in the mid-1800s, who refused to brand his calves. Some mavericks are more obscure than others. On some encased pieces, even though the city or state is not listed, it is fairly obvious where the piece came from, either because the described entity is well known or the address given can only be from one city. An example of the famous entity type is the Souvenir of Cedar Point pieces. Cedar Point immediately suggests the amusement park in Sandusky Ohio, to persons in the Midwest at least. An example of the address type would be the F. B. Melin Co. furniture store pieces with three addresses, 6668 Van Dyke, 23301 Van Dyke and 13831 Woodward Ave. Those pieces self identify to Detroit and Warren. Folks who are unfamiliar with Detroit streets might have to do some research.

Other mavericks require research. Valuable tools include old city and state directories; the Internet, in particular the map and nearby business features of a search engine like Yahoo; and the telephone: calls to local libraries, historical societies or even the businesses themselves.

Some tokens are mavericks even though they give some information as to location, because that information is ambiguous. Tokens that list only the city and not the state can be a problem if there are more than one of those cities in the country. A good example is the Hart Furniture Co. piece, with address of 6022-24 Broad, East Liberty. East Liberty is not an uncommon name for a town and there are quite a few, including two in Ohio, one of which is near Columbus, and one in Pennsylvania. In fact, a good guess would be to attribute the piece to the Ohio town near Columbus, because Broad Street is a main downtown street in Columbus. That would be wrong though, because Ohio’s East Liberty does not have a Broad Street in it. Pennsylvania’s (a suburb of Pittsburgh) does, including an address in the 6000s. That identifies the piece sufficiently to make East Liberty Pennsylvania the attribution of this maverick piece.

Some mavericks will never be located with certainty, like the “Babe’s My Pal” piece. Well, oops here. After I wrote the first sentence, the “Babe’s My Pal” piece has actually been identified to Des Moines Iowa, where Babe had a famous restaurant. How about, “The

Union,” now that one would be almost impossible to absolutely verify. Others are unlikely to be attributed, such as “Globe Loan Co.” because even if a Globe Loan Co. is found, there is usually no evidence that it is the right one.

The tradition in token collecting has been to attribute tokens to cities. Some tokens, however, were not made for cities, but instead for larger geographic areas. A good example would be the encased in my collection with 1937 date: “Souvenir Northwest Territory Celebration 1787-88 1937-38.” I know that there were 150 year anniversary celebrations in several towns in Ohio and Indiana and one in Minnesota (I have a similar token that has a Minnesota city on it) and I suspect elsewhere in the Northwest Territory. This token cannot be attributed to any city or state because its scope is broader than that -- it covers the whole Northwest Territory. It is not a maverick because its location is identifiable. I have not cataloged this token in the Michigan catalog even though Michigan is part of the territory of the piece. Instead, I believe the piece belongs in a catalog of mavericks and encased pieces not identifiable to any particular state.

Because of the tradition to identify tokens to cities, tokens of corporations are attributed to the corporation headquarters, even when the token is national in scope. The best example of this is the attribution to Detroit Michigan of the Chevrolet 1947 and 1948 encased generic pieces announcing the Chevy encased series: “S.A.” Chevrolet’s Got It! You will find that encased listed in this catalog as (MI)-(DET)-CH-10 and -12. Even though the piece is certainly meant to be national in scope, tradition puts it in Detroit, corporate headquarters of the Chevrolet Motor division of the General Motors Corp.

Some pieces did not list a city because the city was not important to the person who commissioned the piece. Examples of this are National and State Park pieces and the Gun Lake piece, cataloged here under (MI)-(WAY)-JO-10. The resort grocery believed that Gun Lake better identified its location than the use of any city. However, in the interest of uniformity, I have decided that if a piece refers to a single geographic area, I will attribute it to a town. Every place has a mailing address and every mailing address has a city and state. It is my job to determine what that mailing address is.

ACE had a Maverick identification program. Members could submit their mavericks, which were given a number and other members submitted attributions. If an Ohio piece has been identified by this program it is listed as AM(x). For the last several years of its existence, the source of the attribution has been listed in the Casement. Once ACE folded, the Encased Collectors International began a “Wrangler” maverick program on its website. Beginning in January 2004, Bob Perdue began to write a column on encased mavericks in NTCA’s “Talkin’ Tokens,” which he has continued sporadically. He keeps a listing of known maverick encased.

The Internet has been very useful in identifying mavericks. Help comes from the map and business location programs, both Yahoo and expedia ([www.yahoo.com](http://www.yahoo.com) and [www.expedia.com](http://www.expedia.com)). Help also comes from the phone exchange website, <http://ourwebhome.com/TENP/TENproject.html>, which contains listings of exchanges from various cities. Also, the search engine, [www.google.com](http://www.google.com) is very useful to find cites that refer to old merchants.

It is quite possible to wrongly identify a maverick, either because of sloppy research or because a piece is ambiguous and the wrong business has been identified. Some reasonable assumptions have to be made. I list a piece as verified if it is very probable that it is from that location based on reasonable assumptions. If there is doubt about the attribution, I list the piece as unverified, and further research is required. I have tried to list the source of my attributions here so that anyone coming behind my work will have a good start. I have made many changes in my work, and it would not surprise me that more changes will be required in the future.

If you are trying to find a Maverick in this catalog, please use the Maverick Cross Check at the end of the catalog. There are still quite a few unverified encased. If you have any information on these unverified Mavericks, please let me know.

## **Merchants**

A trip through a group of encased, and thus through this catalog, can be an interesting journey into the commercial and historic past of the 20th century. The pieces show small and large merchants, small and large towns and historic places and events. Each piece has an interesting story to tell.

One of the things that I have tried to do in this catalog is to find out something about some of the merchants who made the encased pieces in order to give them a human touch. I read somewhere that the half life of a business in this country is five years. For that reason, most of the merchants who made the pieces reported here are no longer in business. But some are, even at the same address. On the other hand, the names of the places, the towns and the streets, have generally stayed the same over the years. The change of name of East Detroit to Eastpointe is a rare exception. I intend to add more color stories to future drafts and editions of this catalog.

## **Michigan Geography**

You may be able to tell that I find geography interesting. I will try to describe the locations of the cities and towns on Michigan encased pieces by reference to points that should be known. Michigan's Lower Peninsula has the shape of a hand (well, actually a right handed glove, because there really aren't any fingers other than the thumb, except maybe a pinky at Traverse City). Detroit is the main city in the far southeast, along the Detroit river, about 40 miles north of the Ohio Michigan border. All the Detroit suburbs will be located by reference to Detroit. The other large Michigan cities generally fall into one of three paths coming out of Detroit. The first is directly west along I-94 which serves Ann Arbor, Jackson, Battle Creek, Kalamazoo and then the sister cities of Benton Harbor and St. Joseph on Lake Michigan. I-96 comes northwest out of Detroit and reaches the capital city, Lansing, in the middle of the state and then Grand Rapids nearer the western end and finally Muskegon on Lake Michigan. I-75 goes mostly north and a little west out of Detroit and comes to Flint in about 40 miles and then Saginaw and Bay City when it reaches Saginaw Bay at the crook of the hand between the thumb and the index finger (if there were an index finger). The cities were there first and the interstate roads were built to accommodate them and not the other way around.

I do have an email from a Michigan Knights of Columbus officer who says that he thinks the 1954 convention would have been in Detroit. I am checking further. Boysville is Michigan's equivalent of Nebraska's more famous Boys' Town. Boysville's headquarters is and was in Clinton, Michigan, but I do not read this piece to allow Boysville's location to govern -- I believe that the piece is about the 1954 convention and, as a side, saying that there was going to be a donation to Boysville. VN, LDe \$10

[ ] MI-XXX-SV-10. 2004, RD,56mm, celluloid with metal back not mirror, blue background with many colored letters. Souvenir/ of/ [to left of cent] USA [to right] 2004// Michigan/ The Wolverine State. Made by ECI to celebrate ECI's partnership with Charleston Mint, which bought the equipment to make these types of encased cents (usually with mirrors). JL \$5

**Adrian** (The county seat of the second county to the west of Lake Erie, bordering on Ohio, about 60 miles SW of Detroit. My high school tennis team played Adrian high school every year, as far south and west as we ever went. We always thought it was an adventurous trip to go all the way to Adrian! Now that I am an adult, the 30 miles that the town is SW of Ypsilanti does not seem all that much)

[ ] (MI)-ADR/MOR-BA-10. 1971D, H, holed at bottom. Bank of Lenawee County/ Adrian-Morenci/ [hole]\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. With Adrian and Morenci in Lenawee County, this is a verified piece. JL, EB, LS, LDe \$5

[ ] MI-ADR-BE-10. 1964, RD,32mm. H.J. Benner// Coins - Stamps/ 511 State St. Adrian, Mich.\ KMANGB. BR, JL, LDe \$3

[ ] MI-ADR-BE-12 1964D, RD,32mm. H.J. Benner// Coins & Stamps/ 511 State St., Adrian, Mich.\ KMANGB. BR, JL \$3. This is a different die than the -10; note the differences -- an ampersand instead of the dash and an extra comma. I have seen five pieces of this piece and on each of them, the line underneath the cent was partially stamped into the cent. Maybe the aluminum planchets were just a bit off from being perfectly centered.

This must be the same Leo Marks, Credit Jeweler, from Toledo Ohio, who made a number of encased pieces, including 1938 and 1939 pieces like this horseshoe one, although that Leo Marks was selling Diamonds, Jewelry and Glasses; and 1946 and 1950 round pieces, with the 1946 Ohio reverse matching the -14 reverse below; and the 1950 Ohio reverse matching the reverse on the -16. **Ahmeek** (Upper Peninsula town, on route 41 just after it crosses into Keweenaw County from Houghton County, about 10 miles N of Houghton -- Keweenaw County is the least populated Michigan county with 1701 residents in 2000)

Phone 444-W/ [small bird like symbol in each corner, looks a bit like a crudely drawn fleur de lis]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. I believe that a year 1915 encased piece is the scarcest of any encased year, thus the “key” piece for the 20th century year set. The 1915 is scarcer than the 1915D (I have never seen or heard of a 1915S). The only encased pieces with a 1915 cent known to me are this piece, and two pieces cataloged in my Ohio catalog, (OH)-(CLE)-NA-10 and OH-MFE-JV-10B. EB, PM \$125

**Alba** (talk about small towns; on the west side of the northern part of the Lower Peninsula, about 20 miles S of Petoskey)

Paul states that this merchant opened for business at 115 S. Superior St. in Albion in 1945 and closed in 1981. It is listed under Miller Jewelers of Albion, Inc. in BP’s 1955 Dun & Bradstreet. LDe \$6

[ ] (MI)-(ALB)-UN-10. 1948, H, holed at top. Union Store// Family Credit Clothiers/ 117 So. Superior St.\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Superior is the main north south street in Albion, and 117 is just south of the main east west street, Michigan Ave., Mich. Rte. 99. JR attributed this to Albion from a list of Union Stores addresses he had. JR \$10

**Algonac** (on the St. Clair River just as it reaches Lake St. Clair, about 30 miles north and east of Detroit; a ferry can take you across to Canada, but there is no bridge here)

[ ] (MI)-ALG/POH/SAN/BAD-CI-22. 1970S, H, holed at bottom. Citizens Federal Savings/ Algonac Port Huron Sandusky// Bad Axe/ [hole]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Each of the four towns listed on this piece is in the thumb area. They are listed on this encasement from furthest south to furthest north, which is probably the order in which this bank added branches. The (MI)-POH-CI-

20 is a 1963 piece for Citizens Federal Savings of Port Huron with no branches listed. There is room under "Bad Axe" for a hole and on the eBay pieces that is where it is; on my piece the hole is in the far lower right corner. JL, EB, EdB, JR \$10

The only Brokus in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet is John, in the garage business (auto repair). LS \$6

**Allen** (on route 12, about 30 miles SW of Jackson)

[ ] MI-ANN-ME-20. 1938, RD, celluloid mirror. Metzger’s Restaurant/ 203 E. Washington St., Ann Arbor Mich. [in a horseshoe around the cent] Keep Me For Good Luck and May You Never Be Broke [to left of cent] Phone [to right] 8987// Where Good Food Insures/ Your Health and Our Success. Metzger’s is a German restaurant, in business in Ann Arbor since 1928, and I

ate there on occasion when I attended the University of Michigan from 1969-1977. This address is just west of the UM campus. A while ago the downtown restaurant closed, and it moved much further west to a shopping center on Zeeb Road, where the food doesn't seem quite as good. EB \$40

**Bad Axe** (about 15 miles south of Lake Huron from the tip of the thumb, 100 miles north of Detroit)

**Battle Creek** (on I-94 about 110 miles W of Detroit, home of Kelloggs)

"De Nooyer Bros Co. of Battle Creek" is listed in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet in the Motor Vehicle Sales business, and "DeNooyer Bros." is also listed under Kalamazoo. LS found listings for DeNooyer Bros. in directories in both cities, from 1946 where the dealership sold Chevrolet and Oldsmobile in Battle Creek and from 1947 where the dealership sold only Chevrolet in Kalamazoo. In addition, one brother, Jacob, lived in Battle Creek, while the other, Jerry, lived in Kalamazoo. There is no way to be absolutely certain that both dealerships gave out the encased cents during the Chevy promotion, but it is likely they did. JL, LS, JR, ACL \$14

This is the first Hauger piece I was with the slogan "The House with a Reputation." The piece I saw had a replaced good 1897 cent in it. MS \$75 (with original cent)

[ ] (MI)-(BCR)-HA-20. 1970D, RD,35mm. Haught for State Senator// [dot]\ KMAYWHGL. I believe that the dot on the bottom was a marker to show where the hole should

be punched out, but on my piece, no hole was punched. It is almost certain that this is a Michigan piece, and Battle Creek is right now the most likely attribution. According to the political graveyard website, Dale A. Haught was the Democratic candidate for the Michigan Senate, 19<sup>th</sup> District in 1970, losing to James G. Fleming of Jackson County, who was the 19<sup>th</sup> District's representative from 1967-1974. The 19<sup>th</sup> District includes all of Calhoun County (Battle Creek's county) and most of Jackson county, so that Mr. Haught may have been from Battle Creek, Marshall, Jackson, or one of the smaller neighboring towns. But as Battle Creek is the largest town in the District, he would certainly have had to do a lot of campaigning there. I acquired this piece from near the 19<sup>th</sup> District, the eBay seller who sold it to me was from Adrian. JL \$6

In the late 1920s, Post cereal company became General Foods Corp. located in Battle Creek. There is a post card on the Internet showing the facilities of the Post Products division of General Foods in Battle Creek. In the year of this piece, General Foods Corp. introduced TANG. In 1985, Phillip Morris bought General Foods for \$5.6 billion. Phillip Morris also bought Kraft and has merged the two companies to make the largest food company in the world. According to the Michigan Secretary of State web site, General Foods corporation is a Delaware corporation organized in 1922. EB \$15

This piece has the type 3 reverse -- where the "I" is directly above the "G" of Good (on type 2, it is slightly to the left of the "G"); and where the lines between the rim and the letters KMANGB do not reach the end of And and the beginning of Never (they go past them on type 2). (MI)-DET-MI-10 and the squat horseshoe, (NY)-BUF-PX-20, Pan American souvenir, have type 2 reverses. The type 1 reverse was made in 1900 and RI-PRO-YO-10 (the 1900 Geo. F. Young Providence Rhode Island piece) is an example. On type 1, the "I" is well to the left of the "G" in Good and the lines between the rim and the KMANGB do not reach the end of the words And and Never. JL, EB, EdB, SA#34,411, LDe; EB \$35

Indeed, the Post Employees Credit Union is still in business in 2001 in Battle Creek, at 240 Cliff St., phone 966-3900. C.W. Post started Post cereals in Battle Creek in 1895. Post Holdings, Inc. is still in the cereal business in 2017. JL, EB, LS, VN \$4

**Bay City** (at the crook of the thumb on Saginaw Bay, not quite 100 miles N and somewhat W of Detroit)

According to expedia, Bay City Michigan is the only Bay City that has a 408 Center Ave., which is 4 blocks east of the Saginaw River. Earl Feddick is listed in the Restaurant business in the 1940 Dun & Bradstreet but is no longer listed in 1953. JL, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-BAY-FI-10. 1927, RD,35mm. Join Our/ Christmas Club// First National Bank/ Largest in Bay City\ KMAYWHGL. This is unverified. There is evidence that First National Bank was founded in Bay City Michigan in the late 1860s and was still there after the First World War. However, the 1940 Dun & Bradstreet lists People's Commercial Savings Bank as the largest of the three listed Bay City MI banks with National Bank of Bay City second. There was also a First National Bank of Bay City Texas, which was acquired by Prosperity Bank in 2002. In 1940, it was arguably the larger of the two listed banks in the Dun & Bradstreet. For the other Michigan drive-in theaters, see MI-CAR-CA-10, MI-CSV-BL-10, (MI)-(DHT)-ST-10, MI-LAP-SV-10 and (MI)-(RED)-TO-10. This drive in and some of the others are listed as "Dead" drive in theaters at [www.driveintheater.com](http://www.driveintheater.com), all except for Stann's and Town Drive In which are not listed. [ ] MI-BAY-UN-10. 1936, RD,35mm. The Union Store// 212 Center Ave./ Bay City, Mich. The reverse was not pictured. There are many other 1936 Union Store pieces, see MI-JAC-UN-10. EB \$12

[ ] MI-BAY-UN-12. 1949, H, holed at top. Union [hole] Store/ Credit Clothing// 113 Center Ave./ Bay City, Mich.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. EB, PCu \$10

[ ] MI-BAY-UN-14. 1950D, H. Union Store/ Family Credit Clothiers/ 113 Center Ave./ Bay City, Mich.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. There was this Union Store in Bay City, one in Albion ((MI)-(ALB)-UN-10), one in Jackson (MI-JAC-UN-10 and -12), one in Pontiac ((MI)-(PON)-UN-10) and one in Saginaw ((MI)-SAG-UN-10, -12 and -14), all selling clothing. There are others in other states. E.g., PA-BET-UN-10, the Union Store, 117 East Third St., Bethlehem, PA. They must have been related. LS, LDe, PCu \$10

**Belding** (about 20 miles E and a bit N of Grand Rapids)

The 1915 is one of the scarcest dates for an encased, and probably the toughest date to obtain to complete the 20th century year set. **Belleville** (small town at the W edge of Wayne county, 30 miles W of Detroit)

**Benton Harbor** (on lake Michigan, across the state, just a bit south of a line directly west of Detroit; my grandfather had a friend in the 50s with a cottage on the lake and he took me here once or twice)

[ ] MI-BEN-AD-10. 1953D, H, red plastic, with cent showing through only on the side with KMANGB/ IBGL, holed at top. The advertising is printed on the reverse side in white lettering: Adler's "66" Serv./ Pipestone-Napier/ Benton Harbor/ Michigan. EB \$15

[ ] MI-BEN-SP-10. 1904, RD,35mm. Spencer and Barnes Co's./ Bed Room Furniture// Will Make Money for You/ [long dash rounded on one end and pointed on the other on each side] Benton Harbor, Mich.\\ KMAAHM. This is an unusual KMAAHM piece, in that there are no die breaks around the clover (see my comments to MI-JAC-FU-10). **Birmingham** (very proper and well to do suburb of Detroit, in Oakland county, around 15 Mile Road, so just under 10 miles N of the Detroit border)

[ ] MI-BIR-HA-10. 1959D, RD,32mm. Pro Tek Tiv Shoes/ Hansel 'N Gretel Shoppe/ 185 Woodward Birmingham, Mich.\ KMANGB. See MI-TRE-NA-10 for other pieces in this Pro Tek Tiv shoe series. LDe \$10

**Buchanan** (in the far SW corner of the state, about 10 miles E of Lake Michigan and just a few miles N of the Indiana border, about 10 miles NW of South Bend)

**Cadillac** (80 miles north of Grand Rapids; good canoeing country)

So far there are no encased that I know of from Cadillac. However, the H.L. Green encased from 1959 has some connections with Cadillac, so I thought I would mention the piece here. There is an old post card on the Internet of Mitchell Street looking north from Cass Street from 1960, which shows an H.L Green Co. store. H.L. Green had stores across the country and was headquartered in New York City, so the piece is cataloged there.

**Calumet** (Upper Peninsula town on Lake Superior, less than 10 miles N of Houghton)

This piece was only known from the Osborne records, until it came on for sale on eBay in April 2017. It is part of the 1950 drive in series, see MI-BAY-ST-10. EB, OR(464) \$15

**Caseville** (in the thumb on Lake Huron, 40 miles NE of Bay City)

[ ] MI-CSV-BL-10. 1949, H. Blue Sky Drive In Theatre/ Caseville, Mich./ 2 Shows Nightly 2/ Rain or Clear\ KMANGB/ IBGL. See, MI-BAY-ST-10 for a list of known Michigan drive-in encased pieces. LDe, PM \$15

**Cassopolis** (10 miles N of the Indiana border, the county seat of Cass county, the second county E of Lake Michigan)

Based on my review of the maps of the lake, I believe that Tubby's most likely had a mailing address of Cassopolis, like the camp. Although the piece itself uses Shavehead Lake to identify the location, it is still a maverick because the piece itself does not list the town. The piece for Joe's Groceries, Gun Lake, attributed to Wayland, is of a similar nature. This was an unknown Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in February 2009. It is the first known Michigan oval piece – see NY-NYC-SA-30 for another oval from NYC. All known oval pieces (and there are only 6 now known to me) come with 1948S cent. JL \$50

**Center Line** (just as Detroit has the enclaves of Hamtramck and Highland Park, Warren has the enclave of Center Line, a box about 2x2 miles right in the middle of Warren on Van Dyke (M53) just south of the Reuther Freeway (I-696))

[ ] MI-CEN-AR-12B. 1962D, H. Same words as on the -12A. LS, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-(CEN)-JE-10. 1957D, H, holed at bottom. J. E. Grissom Plymouth, Inc./ Van Dyke at 10 Mile// Slocum 7-2000/ [hole]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Must be a relative of Art. Note the phone number, the same as Art's except for the first "0" instead of a "1." Art Grissom [must be a typo] Buick and J.E. Grissom Plymouth are both listed under Center Line in the 1960 D & B. Only Art, this time Grissom, is listed in the 1953 D & B. JL \$12

**Charlotte** (20 miles southwest of Lansing)

**Cheboygan** (on Lake Huron, about 15 miles SE of Mackinaw City)

**Chesaning** (small town about 10 miles S and a bit W of Saginaw)

[three dots each one slightly larger than the one before, followed by a star and a slightly larger star, on each side] Good as Money/ [three stars starting at the bottom left] Good for 25¢ on Every \$5 Purchase at// [two short squiggly lines] Burrows, [two short squiggly lines, followed by a longer squiggly design going up to the right of the cent]/ [longer squiggly design] Greenebaum/ [two squiggly lines] & Co./ Chesaning [star in right corner]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. According to Yahoo, the only Chesaning in the United States is in Michigan. PM reported in 2001 that a collection of Chesaning tokens was stolen before it could arrive at the Chesaning historical museum and that this piece with 1905 cent was part of the theft. I have never seen the 1905 piece, or a picture, to compare dies, but it is very rare for these early dates to come with two different original dates three years apart. **Clare** (in the middle of the state, 75 miles N of Lansing)

**Coleman** (in the middle of the state about 75 miles N of Lansing, on M10, not quite 10 miles SE of Clare)

**Davison** (10 miles directly E of Flint)

**Dearborn** (the first suburb directly West of Detroit, the place where Henry Ford built the main Ford headquarters, home of Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford museum)

Dearborn must have switched to seven digits along with Detroit, probably around 1948. 22158 Michigan Ave. is 2 1/2 blocks west of Oakwood Blvd. and thus on the west side of Dearborn. I called the Dearborn Historical Museum Library to get the low down on "West Dearborn." There is not now and never was a city named West Dearborn. Dearborn was formed in 1929 by the consolidation of Fordson, which was the east side and Dearborn, which was the west side and the entirety has been known as Dearborn ever since. However, the area of the city east of Greenfield Road is called east Dearborn and the area west of Greenfield is known as west Dearborn. **Detroit** (I had my first real full time paying job in Detroit in 1977 and stayed there until 1979 when I got married and moved to Chicago. I worked in the Federal Building on Fort Street at Cass downtown for Judge DeMascio who was the judge in charge of the Detroit school busing case at the time. Those were interesting times in Detroit, a town which has seen many interesting times.

Detroit’s geography is also interesting -- the Detroit river turns mostly east at downtown Detroit before it reaches Lake St. Clair. Thus, Windsor, Ontario lies south of downtown Detroit and to reach Canada via either the Ambassador Bridge or the tunnel, you travel south. I remember attending the 1994 ANA convention in Detroit at the Renaissance Center and looking south over the river into Canada.

The main roads in Detroit tend to be very long and extend well into the suburbs, keeping the same name in all towns. For example, Michigan route 12 is named Michigan Avenue from its start in downtown Detroit, through Dearborn, Inkster, Wayne, Westland, Canton Township and Ypsilanti. For all I know, it is probably Michigan Ave. for most of the way to Chicago. The main east-west streets north of Detroit are named for how many miles north of downtown they are. This starts with 5 Mile Road (called Fenkell in Detroit; and businesses on Fenkell made quite a few encased) and 6 Mile Road (McNichols) and goes way out to 32 Mile Road at the north end of Macomb county. Five key streets come out of downtown -- Michigan going west, described above; Gratiot (named for Ft. Gratiot near Port Huron, where the road leads to, which itself was named for a Colonel in William Henry Harrison’s army) and Grand River make a V, Gratiot going northeast and Grand River going northwest; Woodward (named for Michigan Territorial Judge Augustus Woodward who developed the plans to rebuild Detroit after the major 1805 fire), which goes mostly north and a bit west well into the northern suburbs; and Jefferson which goes east along the Detroit river, turns north through the five Grosse Pointe suburbs and continues through St. Clair Shores along Lake St. Clair. The main north south roads

are Telegraph in the far west, which goes through Taylor and Dearborn and then finally through Detroit's far northwest side; Wyoming, which forms the border between Dearborn and Detroit, but then continues on for another seven miles or so through the middle of Detroit, Livernois, about a mile east of Wyoming and Van Dyke on the near east side, which continues north through Warren.)

It is also listed in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages under Surplus Merchandise, at these addresses with "HP" (Highland Park) noted for the 13912 Woodward address. VN, OR(2107) (though ordered by and delivered to a novelty company in Cleveland Heights Ohio) \$10

[ ] MI-DET-AM-20. 1954 quarter, RD,38mm, brass, holed at top. American [hole] Savings/ [two small eagles on each side of the quarter]// 8th Anniversary 1955 Detroit, Mich.\ American [hole] Savings/ [another two small eagles]// Save the American Way. Not all that rare but popular because there are not all that many encased quarters. It sold for \$21 in 1984. CK sold a similar piece (particularly as to the eagles) from Las Vegas with a 1954 quarter as lot G24 in his sale #153. It is round and says: A Multi-Million [hole] Dollar Institution/ [eagle on each side, like the eagles on this piece]// First Western Savings/ Las Vegas, Nevada\ Earn More [hole] With Safety/ [two more eagles one on each side of the quarter]// First Western Savings. The Las Vegas piece is much rarer than this Detroit piece. JL, LS, RH(9/4/84),872, BS#31,50, KK196, MK (probably the same piece), PC#21,821, LDe \$30

Bayer as an electrical contractor in Detroit. This makes Detroit almost certain due to address, phone number and timing. 15021 E. Warren Ave. is on the northeast side of Detroit, not far from Grosse Pointe. According to the phone exchange website, TUXedo was a phone exchange on Detroit's northeast side, including Grosse Pointe. Detroit was one of the earlier cities in the country to change over from 6 digits to 7, which occurred between 1940 (when there were some 7 digit numbers according to the Detroit phone directory) and then completely, based on the phone numbers on Detroit encased, between 1946 and 1948. Co., Newton, Iowa, as I have a 1959 piece with the paper insert that says "Put Your Ad on this Token, it Builds Business, Jim Chapman, Rep. Wytheville, Va." and on the other side: "Newton Mfg. Co. 50th Year Specialty Advertising," and I have seen quite a few other plastic pieces for other Newton representatives. The Newton Mfg. Co. is still in the advertising specialty business in Newton Iowa in 2001, and a phone call confirmed that it started in business in 1909. Manufacturing operations ceased in 1943, however, and the company became solely a distributor then, outsourcing all manufacturing. There are two types of these pieces: type 1 does not have USA above the hole and is somewhat green in color; type 2 has USA above the hole and is

somewhat yellow in color. Duane Feisel first reported the two types in his California encased catalog. This address is about 6 blocks east of Grand River near Livernois. Tyler (TY) was a Detroit phone exchange, although Detroit is so big that most phone numbers are used. This piece was attributed by LDe and based on the address and phone number I would say it is almost certainly correct to Detroit. LS reports that this address did not exist in the 1935 Detroit directory, but that in 1940, Hyman Feldman was listed as operating a filling station at this address. LDe \$10

Cedar was a Dearborn exchange, as we know from the Dearborn Machinery Movers Co. pieces. LDe \$15

The eBay seller said that Briggs Manufacturing Co. made engines for Ford and went on to become Briggs Stratton. EB \$50

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-BR-40. 1949D, H, holed at top. [hole]/ Brady's// [star each side of cent]/ 10206 Dexter/ Larry – Jim – Joe\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was a tavern – it is listed at this address in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. The piece was delivered to this address by Osborne. JL, OR(173) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-BS-10. 1950D, RD,38mm, brass. [clover each side] Good Luck// from B [dot] S [dot] F & D\\ [branch to left only] Good Luck// is 75% of the right attitude. BP found out that Brooke, Smith, French and Dorrance was a large national advertising agency located in Detroit. While it is possible that there could have been another BSF&D somewhere else, that would seem unlikely, so that this piece is probably for this agency and from Detroit. EB \$18

[ ] (MI)-DET-BU-10. 1906 or 1907, RD,38mm. [diagonal pointing down in two lines] Never/ More [going straight across] Buck's \$999 [diagonal in two lines pointing up] Never/ Less// Suits & Overcoats/ Cor. Cass & Michigan Ave, Detroit\\ "IBGL"// "KMANGB" [type 2 clover design with lower relief]. The 1906 eBay pieces have the cent in backwards compared to all other known

Bucks examples -- i.e., on the eBay piece the cent obv. faces the encasement obv. It matches the 1907 eBay piece in dies. RH reports that on his piece there is a comma after Ave and not a period, and the supersized piece on eBay showed that that is correct. The "Never More" was and is a common advertising technique; "Never Less" much less so. I would guess that the combination on this piece meant: don't bother to bargain, the price is \$9.99. EB, DG#97,11, RH, LDe; JL, EB \$25

[ ] (MI)-DET-BU-12. 1907 or 1908, RD,38mm. Buck's/ 999 1499 [on each side of the cent at 10:30 and 1:30 with the 99s in smaller letters]// Suits & Overcoats/ Cor. Michigan & Cass Ave. Detroit./ [small signature block: N.J.A. Co.] \\ "IBGL"// "KMANGB." This is also the low relief clover type reverse, which I call type 2 -- as contrasted to the type 1 high relief clover as on the common 1901 Buffalo Pan American Exposition clover cataloged as NY-BUF-PX-10 to -18. DG cataloged a 1907 round which he described: "Buck's Suits & Overcoats, \$4.99-9.99, cor. Michigan & Cass Ave." DG#66,412. If DG cataloged this one right, the price of a coat was reduced substantially in 1907 before it was raised in 1908, so I am not going to list this piece unless I see another reference to it. In any event, the Buck promise of "never more" made in the piece above was gone by 1907, when the \$14.99 coats came out. The eBay 1907 and my 1908 are from the same dies. EB, VN, CDG#30, LDe, PC1; JL, LDe, KK197 \$25

[ ] (MI)-DET-BU-14. 1909 Lincoln, RD,38mm. This piece has the same obverse die as the -10, with only \$9.99 as the selling price, but a completely different reverse die: LPPP, I'm It. This is the same style die as on the reverse of the 1901 clover pieces, the most common of which is the Buffalo Pan American Exposition clover encased, NY-BUF-PX-10 to -18. However, this is a different set of dies than the A1 to B5 reverse dies identified in my New York catalog and TAMS articles on the Pan Am Expo encased. For one thing, there are only three notches in the horseshoes at the top and the bottom, not four. I cannot explain why Buck's went back to using only \$9.99 in 1909 after having gone to \$9.99 and \$14.99 in 1907 and 1908 unless the old die was lying around and they wanted to make another piece. EB \$15

[ ] (MI)-DET-BU-16. 1910, 1911, 1912D or 1913, RD,38mm. All three pieces have the same obv. die as the -12 (including the N.J.A. Co. signature), but the reverse is as on the -14, the LPPP, I'm it reverse. The 1911, 1912D and 1913 encasements are oriented differently: the 1911 and my 1912D are like U.S. coins -- flip vertically to align obverse and reverse of the encasement. Thus, on these pieces the cent is oriented with the encasement on both sides. However, the eBay 1912D and the 1913 encasement are oriented like a Canadian coin -- one must flip the encasement horizontally to align obverse and reverse. For this reason, the cent reverse is upside down to the encasement obverse. All three pieces 1911-1913 also have the same reverse dies. I have not seen the 1910. PCu; JL, BP, LDe; JL, EB; JL, EB, LDe \$15

[ ] (MI)-DET-BU-20. 1948, H, holed at bottom. Buster's Service/ General Repair// 3715 John R./ Detroit [hole] TE 2-9073\\KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in March 2013. EB \$12

[ ] MI-DET-CA-10. 1931, RD,35mm. Cadillac Casket Co.// Detroit/ Mich.\\ KMANGB. Encased coins are somewhat scarce from the depression years, just like coins are. Few businesses were willing to spend money on frivolities like advertising when they were fighting for their lives. JL, LS, LDe, BS#73,34 \$15

[ ] (MI)-DET-CA-20. 1946, H. Mike Casey Used Cars/ Detroit// The Honest/ Irishman\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. There is a space between Casey and Used at the top of this piece that I suspect is there so that a hole could be added. There is, however, no hole on this piece. JL, LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CA-30. 1953D, H, holed at bottom. Carrie's Auto Supply/ 2465 S. Fort/ WA. 8-9809/ General [hole] Repairs\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. BP acquired this piece at the IKO TAMS show in 2002, and it had "Detroit" on the 2x2. I could not find this business in Detroit or any of the south suburbs in the 1953 D & B. However, a google search on the Internet showed that "Glen's Used Car & Truck" is at 2465 S. Fort, Detroit with phone 928-0208. Based on address and phone number (WA 8 is 928) and the fact that there is an auto business at the same location today, I believe the piece is almost certainly a Detroit piece. I would like to find the business in a directory to absolutely verify though. BP \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CE-10. 1950S, H. Central Floor Covering/ 21520 Grand River/ KE. 1-2177. This address is right at McNichols (6 Mile Road). KE (Kenwood) was a Detroit, Redford Township exchange, and this location is indeed near Redford Township. In fact, the Detroit Crane Co., located just north of 8 Mile Road, had phone no. KE 2-4770 (see (MI)-(SOU)-12 to -16). This company is listed under Carpets in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages, with three locations, including this one, with this phone no. According to BP's 1955 D & B, it was established in 1946. VN, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-10. 1946, H, holed at bottom. Chesterfield Bar// 4721 John R. St./ TE. [hole] 2- 8368\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The address and phone scream Detroit. Note that this is at the same address and phone as Chesterfield Lounge, below, so it must have been the same establishment, changing its description from "Bar" to the gentler "Lounge" between 1946 and 1947. JL \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-12. 1947D, B, holed at top. Chesterfield/ Lounge/ [squiggly design on each side of the cent]// 4721 John R. St./ TE. 2-8368\\ IBGL/ KMANGB. The Chesterfield Lounge was a jazz club, located just a block outside the black section of Detroit known as Black Bottom (according to the Detroit Free Press geography, Black Bottom went to Brush, which is the block east of John R). According to a 1973 article in the Detroit Free Press posted on the Internet, Paradise Valley, the business district in the black section "attracted all of the best black entertainers in the country." An article from the Detroit News, also posted on the Internet, cited a book by Lars Bjorn entitled, "Before Motown: A History of Jazz in Detroit 1920-1960." The book listed the Chesterfield Lounge at 4721 John R. as one of the many Detroit jazz hot spots. This address is just south of Warren Ave. and thus just SE of Wayne State University. JL, EB, LS, LDe, BS#40,90 \$20

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-20. 1947D, RD,35mm. "S.A."// Chevrolet's Got It!\\ KMAYWHGL. There is no beading around the cent on either side, although there are denticles near the rim on the reverse. This is the generic piece for the 1947 and 1948 Chevrolet encased series program. What did "SA" stand for? Joel Reznick points out that "Satisfaction Always" was a Chevy advertisement slogan in the 30s and 40s. Indeed, Bob Perdue sent me a Chevrolet ad from 1947 that speaks of the "S.A." Special, with the heading "Satisfaction All-ways!" However, the late 40s Chevies were much sexier than the prior versions. Could Chevrolet have wanted its customers to think of the more subtle meaning that couldn't be publicly spoken in 1947? This piece is attributed

to Detroit because the corporate headquarters of the Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors were there in 1947-48. According to the history section of the General Motors website, the division was established in Detroit in 1911 and was there until 1980, when it moved to Warren Michigan. Corporate headquarters moved back to Detroit in 1998. JL \$6

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-22. 1947D, RD,35mm. Same obverse die as the -10, but a different reverse die: KMANGB, with beading around the cent and denticles near the rim. EB \$6

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-24. 1948D, RD,35mm. "S.A."// Chevrolet's Got It!\\ KMANGB. This is a different obverse die than the -10 and -12, although the words are the same. Lay a straight edge over the "I" of this piece and it will cross over the "E" of Chevrolet on the other side. Do the same with the -10 version and the straight edge will be between the "E" and the "V." Only the tail of the apostrophe is below the adjoining "S"; on the -10, almost all of the apostrophe is below the "S." It is also a different reverse die. The words are the same as on the -12, but there is no beading and no denticles. JL, LDe \$6

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CH-30. 1954D, H, holed at bottom. Chene Hardware Co./ 1544 Chene St.// WO. [this line slightly above] 1- [hole] 1603 [this line slightly below] 1- [hole] 1604\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The following entry appears in my 1955 Detroit yellow pages: "Chene Hardware 1544 Chene Woodward 1-1603. Thus this piece is absolutely attributed to Detroit. JL \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CL-10. 1948, H. Club Grand/ 11927 Grand River/ WE. 5-9849. This address is one block west of Wyoming on the northwest side. There were Webster and Weather exchanges in Detroit, which match the WE. Club Grand is listed at 11927 Grand River in my 1955 Detroit yellow pages, although its phone number has changed to TExas 4-6088. It had entertainment Friday & Saturday evenings. VN, JR, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CL-20. 1949D, RD,32mm, Brass. Club Bar/ [to left of cent] 1950 [to right of cent] 1950// TA 5-9811/ 18<sup>th</sup> & Myrtle\\ KMANGB. You might not be able to find Myrtle St. anymore in Detroit, because it has been renamed Martin Luther King Blvd. This intersection is just northeast of where the Jeffries Freeway (I-96) and the Fisher Freeway (I-75) come together today. BP found Club Bar in the 1942 Detroit phone book at 2600 Myrtle with phone Lafayette 9811. It was still there in 1955, now with phone TAshmo 5-9811 as on this piece. The address is a match with the piece, as according to Yahoo, 2600 Martin Luther King Blvd. is at 18th Street. According to the phone exchange website, the Lafayette exchange became TAshmoo 5-. That exchange was named after a ship that sunk in the 1930s (see (MI)-(DET)-GR-20 for that story). See, (MI)-(DET)-ST-70 for another Detroit business with a TA 5 phone number. JL, EB, LDe \$18

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CL-22. encased token with zodiac sign, RD,32mm. Same obv. words and same obv. die as on the -20, but the rev. is one line: KMAYWHGL. When I first heard of the Aquarius token from Kurt Kruger's sale, I thought it must be a replacement for the -20. But then Bob Perdue sold one with a Taurus bull on eBay, and I came to the conclusion that it must be a series. I then noticed that BP's piece is aluminum, not brass, and that it had a different rev. slogan. EB(BP) (with Taurus); KK494 (with an Aquarius Lucky No. token) \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-CL-24. 1959D quarter, RD,45mm, lucite. Club Bar/ Detroit. I would think this was the same establishment that made the -20 and -22 1950 encased cent and token. LDe \$25

[ ] MI-DET-CL-30. 1954D, H, holed. Club Alamo, Detroit, Mi. The Alamo Cocktail Lounge and Dining Room Inc. is listed in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet. BS#35,13 \$8

[ ] MI-DET-CO-10. 1928, B. Good for \$2.00 on/ Any Purchase/ of \$15.00 or Over// [star each side of the cent]/ Cohen's/ Credit Jewelers/ 5909 Chene St. Detroit, Mich./ [star in each corner]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This location is just one block north of Wisniewski's Cigar Store, which made an encased cent in the same time frame (1925). This is unusual for a bell, but my piece was not holed at the top of the bell as made. JL, EB, PCMT, LDe \$30

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CO-20. 1947, H. Coogan & Shumerski/ Mercury/ 13832 Jos. Campau/ J. Camburn TW. 3-2300. J. Camburn must have been a salesman for the dealership. It is identified by the 1959, -26 piece for Dave Coogan with the same phone number. In the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet, there is a listing for Dave Coogan, Inc. under automobile dealers, founded in 1946, and it is listed at this address and phone in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. Even without that, where else would Jos. Campau Street be? This address is indeed Detroit, not Hamtramck, in the same block as old Lasky's Furniture -- see (MI)-DET-LA-10 for why this is Detroit, not Hamtramck. In 2001, there are 6 car dealers in the 12000 and 13000 blocks of Jos. Campau. LDe (attributed to Hamtramck, although he lists the -26 piece, which has Detroit on it, to Detroit) \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CO-22. 1947, H, holed at bottom. Coogan & Shumerski/ Mercury// 13832 Jos. Campau/ J. Noonan [hole] TW. 3-2300\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This is the second person, probably a salesman, to be listed on a 1947 piece. I wonder how many different pieces there are? JL, EB \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CO-24. 1948D, H, holed at top. Coogan & [hole] Shumerski/ Mercury// 13832 Jos. Campau/ TW. 3-2300\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Here is a piece similar to the 1947 pieces, but with no salesman listed. LS, EB \$12

[ ] MI-DET-CO-26. 1959 or 1959D, H, holed at bottom. Dave Coogan/ Detroit, Mich.// Mercury - Comet/ TW. 3 [hole] -2300\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. EK, LDe; JL, CB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-CO-30. Unknown memorial reverse, H. Cole & Erwin Jewelers// 200 State St.\\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. BP found a post card for Cole & Erwin Jewelers in Detroit. In the 1955 Detroit directory, it was at 123 State. With the exact same match, I believe it logical to conclude the business moved down the street between 1955 and the time this piece came out. EB \$8

[ ] (MI)-DET/DEA-CR-10. 1961D, RD,32mm. Child Life Shoes// Crowley's/ Detroit-Dearborn\\ KMANGB. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when I bought it from NP in 2014. It is part of the shoe series for many different types of shoes in the late 50s and early 60s. There are other Child Life Shoe pieces from Utica, New York (Foot Poise Shoe Store, NY-UTI-FO-10), Iowa City (Evers Footware, IA-IOW-EV-10) and Denver (Hi-Lo Shoe Store, CO-DEN-HI-10), as well as a generic 1961D piece that says: "Retailer's Store Name/ and Address Here." JL \$6

[ ] (MI)-DET-DA-20. 1928, RD. J. Daus Filling Station/ Cedar 5689/ 1709 Lawndale/ Detroit\\ KMAYWHGL. 1709 Lawndale is just south of the Vernor Highway near Livernois, on the southwest side of town, not far from the Ambassador Bridge. I remember attending a party at

a house in that area in the late 70s -- the houses in the neighborhood were all large elegant old homes, which were valued far below their replacement cost. There is no gas station there today, the nearest station is 1/4 mile away on Vernor Highway. Although this is the first of the -DA pieces in dates, I have given this the -20 catalog number, so that the Fankhauser piece can keep its -10 designation. KC \$14

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DA-30. 1929, RD,35mm. Davis/ Furniture Co./ \*??9 John R. St./ Near Montana/ 7624 Fenkell Ave./ Near Tuller. Montana Street meets John R at around 17324, between Six and Seven Mile Roads. North of Six Mile is in Detroit and south of Six Mile is Highland Park, so it appears that this location was Detroit. 7624 Fenkell (5 Mile Road) is just west of Tuller Street, about 6-7 blocks west of Livernois, just south of the Lodge Freeway. In the 1942 Detroit phone directory, Davis Furniture Co. is listed at 15041 Grand River. LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DA-40. 1955D, RD,35mm. Dave's Show Bar/ 7510 Woodward// TR 2-8724\ KMAYWHGL. 7510 Woodward is just north of Grand Boulevard E. TRiangle and TRinity were Detroit exchanges. BP found Dave's Show Bar listed in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet as an eating place that served alcoholic beverages, established in 1948. It was also listed at this address and phone (the TRinity exchange) in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. JL, LDe \$8

[ ] MI-DET-DA-10. 1960D large, RD,32mm. Dance & Dance// Detroit, Mich./ 5925 University TU 2-3887\ KMANGB. BR, JL, LDe \$3

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-10. 1946, RD,35mm. Detroit Wonder Bar/ Sammy Sofferin// Famous for Food\ KMAYWHGL. BP found this in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet, coded as an eating place that serves alcoholic beverages. JL, EB, BP, EdB, CK#162,L38, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-20. 1946, RD,35mm. Detroit Ball Bearing Co./ of Michigan/ U.S.A.\ KMAYWHGL. The home piece of a series of pieces done in 1946 for this large business, which was a distributor of bearings, power transmission and other automotive products. According to the Michigan corporation website, the Invetech Company was formed in 1917 and used "Detroit Ball Bearing Company of Michigan" as an assumed name. Its agent was in Detroit and all indications from the Internet sites are that its corporate headquarters were in Detroit. It had operations all over Michigan and indeed the country -- at one point it had three large distribution centers and 86 branch locations in 19 states. It was acquired by a large Cleveland based corporation, Applied Industrial Technologies in 1997, a company which Invetech itself had once owned, which announced that it was acquiring Detroit based Invetech. This corporate history was confirmed by an email from Applied Technologies. The other known pieces in the series are for locations in Detroit (see the next piece), Grand Rapids MI-GRA-DE-10, Kalamazoo MI-KAZ-DE-10 and Saginaw MI-SAG-DE-10 and Lima Ohio for the Detroit Ball Bearing Co. of Ohio, OH-LIM-DE-10. VN, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-22. 1946, RD,35mm. Detroit Ball Bearing Co. of Michigan/ 110 West Alexandrine Ave./ Detroit 1/ [hole]\ KMAYWHGL. This address, which today is given as "Alexandrine Street," is in Midtown just South of Wayne State, between Cass and Woodward. JL, EB, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-30. 1947, H, holed at bottom. De Cru's Bar/ 1901 E. Warren// TU. [hole] 1-9808\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Must be Detroit by address and 1947 seven digit phone number. See (MI)-(DET)-BA-20 for another 1947 piece, Bayer's All-Electric & Appliance Co. at 15021 E. Warren with phone TU. 1-0440, the TUXedo exchange. This was an unlisted piece when it came on for sale on eBay in December 2012 and BP told me that a google map view of this address showed a saloon still there today, the "High Noon Saloon." JL \$10

[ ] MI-DET-DE-40. 1948D, RD,35mm. Dexter Chevrolet Co.// 11534 Dexter/ Detroit 6, Mich.\ KMANGB. Dexter Chevrolet is where I bought my first car, a new Chevette (no not a Corvette), for just a bit more than \$3000, in the winter of 1977. I remember going out to order it. I left work early, just after lunch, because of a snowstorm and reached the showroom just after 6 PM, averaging just over a mile an hour. 11534 Dexter is east of the intersection of Grand River and Livernois in a residential section. The dealership was not on Dexter anymore in 1977, it was further out, in the northwest corner of the city, on one of the mile roads. It also is not there anymore, or is not Dexter Chevrolet now. This dealership should not be confused with the Dexter Chevrolet dealership now in the Michigan city of Dexter, which is about 10 miles west of Ann Arbor. JL, ACL, LDe \$14

[ ] MI-DET-DE-50. 1948, H, holed at top. [hole]/ [six pointed star with an open circle on each side] Del Rio Bar// 4704 Third St./ TE. 2-8640/ Detroit, Michigan\ KMAYWHGL// [rabbit's foot and yin yang where "IBGL" words usually are -- same rev. as the (MI)-(RED)-TO-10]. JL, EB, LDe, JR \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-DE-60. 1948, H, holed. Dee's Sport Shop & Hardware/ 19807 Vandyke/ Detroit/ TW 3-5566. LDe, BS#75,255 \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-DE-70. 1949, RD,35mm. Detroit Fire Department// WO. 2-0400\ Detroit Industrial/ Safety Council. EB, LS \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-80. 1965, RD,35mm. Detroit Postal Employees Credit Union/ PH: 963-1795// Free/ Sample\ KMANGB. The Detroit Postal Employees Credit Union continues in existence in 2001, at 1351 E. Jefferson Avenue, with \$74 million in assets. JL, LS, LDe \$4

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DE-90. 1979 dollar, RD, 44mm, lucite. 80th Anniversary Detroit Golf Club/ 1899-1979. According to the Detroit Golf Club's website, the club was indeed founded in 1899. Its first location was at Woodward and Six Mile Road; in 1902, it moved to Six Mile and Hamilton. LDe \$15

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-DI-10. 1946, H, holed at bottom. Diccico Garage/ 12116 Harper [phone exchange and 4 digit phone no. hard to read on scan due to tinpest in the area, although the exchange starts with "P" and the numbers look like 4?57]// Towing [hole] Service. Diccico Garage and Diccico Sales and Service (listed in the auto business) are both listed under Detroit in the 1953 D & B with start year of 1946. It is not listed under "garages" or "towing" in my 1955 Detroit yellowpages. BP found an article about racing in Detroit on the Internet and in it is a picture of a jeep helping the racers with "Diccico Garage" painted on the top of the jeep. BP \$10

[ ] MI-DET-DO-10. 1948, RD,35mm. Don Homer Chevrolet Co.// 9767 Grand River Ave./ Detroit 4, Mich\\ KMANGB. ACL had the address at 8767. EB, VN, BS#75,67, SA#66,887 (very worn), SH#17,829, LDe, JR, ACL \$14

[ ] MI-DET-DO-20. 1951D, RD,35mm. Douglas Coal Co./ 14438 Hamilton Ave.// [six sided star with open circle in center on each side] TO - 86770/ Detroit 3, Mich.\\ KMANGB. This address is in the center of town, about 1/2 mile NE of the current intersection of the Lodge and Davison freeways. JL, LDe, PCu \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-EA-10. 1936, H. East End Family Laundry/ Lenox 2241-42// 2559 Hillger Ave./ With a Better Service\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. TCr sent me the reference to this piece when it came on for sale on eBay in May 2005 and tentatively attributed it to Detroit because Hillger is on Detroit's east side just west of the Daimler Chrysler Jefferson Assembly plant. Today Hillger is a small street and Yahoo says that 2559 is not a valid address, but my guess is that it was once larger but the building of the plant affected it. Lenox was a Detroit east side exchange until the main switchover to 7 digits in 1948 or thereabouts (see, (MI)-(DET)-HE-10). The final nail in the coffin is that East End Family Laundry is listed under Detroit in the 1940 Dun & Bradstreet. JL \$12

[ ] MI-DET-EA-20. 1947, H. Eastwood Park/ Gratiot and 8 Mile Rd.// Detroit, Mich.\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Eastwood Park was an amusement park that opened in 1925 and closed in 1953. Detroit is on the south side of Gratiot and 8 Mile and East Detroit, now known as Eastpointe, on the north. LS correctly points out that Eastwood Park was on the north side and thus actually located in East Detroit, as is verified by several Internet sites on old amusement parks and roller coasters. However, on many advertisements, the park identified itself as from Detroit, as it did on this piece, and therefore, I am going to list it here, where people will expect to find it. This is inconsistent with how Paul Cunningham listed maverick Eastwood Park pieces in his Michigan Trade Tokens book, although none of the pieces he listed there had "Detroit" on them like this piece does. JL, EB, LDe, BS#44,59, PC1 (without cent) \$18

[ ] (MI)-DET-EC-10. 1946, H. [rope or cable all around the outer edge of the encasement, very unusual] Economy Linen Service/ 10515 Harper [six pointed star on either side of the cent]// PL 9254 Detroit [diamond in each corner]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL [I Bring is very small}. JL, JR, VN, EB, LS, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-DET-EC-12. 1946, H. Economy Linen Service/ 10515 Harper Ave./ PL. 9154 Detroit. LDe did list all three Economy Linen pieces in his catalog. Either this piece was incorrectly reported to LDe and does not exist or it was an error piece with the wrong phone number. The only difference between this and the -10 is the second digit of the phone number. LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-DET-EC-14. 1948, H, holed at top. Economy Linen Service// 10515 Harper/ WA. 1-9254 Detroit\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The phone number changed between 1946 and 1948 from 6 to 7 digits. Oftentimes, these changeovers included a change of exchanges. According to the Internet phone exchange website, the PLaza exchange became WALnut 1. This piece also has a different reverse die than the -10 1946 piece. That piece has a very small "I Bring," while the "I Bring" on this piece is pretty large. In its advertisement in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages, this

business says it is a “Complete Linen and Towel Rental Service for All of Michigan.” JL, EB, DG#66,414, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-EL-10. 1947, H, holed at bottom. Ellis Loan Co./ Clothes - Furs - Diamonds// 401 Gratiot Ave./ Half [hole] Priced\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This business would be within hailing distance of Berns, (MI)-DET-BE-10, and only a couple of blocks from the Simmons & Clark Jewelers, (MI)-DET-SI-10 and -12. There are 7 loan companies listed nearby on Gratiot in the 1955 yellow pages, including “Eli’s Loan Ofc” at 415 Gratiot, “Jackson’s Loan Ofc” at 473 and “Gratiot Loan Office” at 501. Samuel Ellis is listed in the 1940 D & B in the pawnbroker and men’s clothing business. With that information, BP put the final touches on the verification of this piece – he found Samuel Ellis listed at 401 Gratiot in the men’s clothing business. By necessity many merchants had to go into the loan business back before credit cards became ubiquitous. EB \$8

[ ] MI-DET-EM-10. 1948D, RD,35mm. Emmert/ Chevrolet Co.// 20000 Grand River/ Detroit, Mich.\\ KMANGB. VN, EB, JR, ACL (ACL had the address as 2000) \$14

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FA-10. 1920, RD,35mm. [in two lines to the top left of the cent] Compliments/ of [continuing to the right] The Family Store/ 196 Gratiot Ave. Cor. St. Antoine St.// Ladies’ and Gents’/ Clothing and Furnishings\\ Don’t Lose Me/ I Will Save You 10% Discount// On Purchase for/ Period of 1920. Today, St. Antoine St. is about 4 blocks NE of the start of Gratiot Ave. in downtown Detroit, and according to Yahoo and Expedia, 196 Gratiot is a couple blocks SW of the intersection with St. Antoine. However, LS reports that in the 1919 Michigan GAZETTER, the Family Store is indeed listed at 196 Gratiot Ave. Although this is very rare, the addresses on Gratiot changed over time, as the 1916 Detroit city directory shows that St. Antoine then intersected Gratiot between street number 199 and 202. BP found the Family Dept. Stores, Inc. in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet, listed under family clothing. EB, LDe \$25

[ ] (MI)-(DET)/(WAR)-FB-10. 1945, RD,35mm. F.B. Melin Co./ Fine Furniture Since 1904// 6668 Van Dyke/ 23301 Van Dyke\\ Victory Rev. type 1. Verified by the next pieces, particularly the -18, but in any case, where else would a street like Van Dyke be long enough to have both 6668 and 23301 addresses. 6668 is in Detroit, just north of I-94. 23301 is in Warren, between 9 and 10 Mile Roads. This merchant is no longer in business in 2000 at either location. BP found F.B. Melin & Co. Furn in the 1942 Detroit phone book at 6668 Van Dyke. LDe did not give any reverse information in his catalog, even as to this Victory reverse piece. JL, EB, LDe \$16

[ ] (MI)-(DET)/(WAR)/(HIG)-FB-12. 1945 or 1946, H. F.B. Melin & Co./ Fine Furniture Since 1904// 6668 Van Dyke/ 23301 Van Dyke/ 13831 Woodward\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 13831 Woodward is in the enclave of Highland Park. The two Van Dyke addresses and the Woodward address can only be in the Detroit area. JL; EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)/(WAR)/(HIG)-FB-14. 1946, H. Same words as on the -12, but different obverse and reverse dies. On this piece, the beginning “F.” points down to the “F” in Furniture below; on the -12, it points to the “U.” On the reverse of this piece, the words “Good Luck” are nearly vertical; on the -12, they are nearly horizontal. The eBay seller correctly attributed this piece to Detroit. EB, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)/(HIG)-FB-16. 1947, H, holed at bottom. F.B. Melin & Co./ Fine Furniture Since 1904// 6668 Van Dyke/ 13831 [hole] Woodward\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The Warren store is gone from this piece. MR, VN, TH \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET/(HIG)-PON-FB-18. 1953D, H, holed at bottom. F.B. Melin & Co./ 13831 Woodward Ave.// 6668 Van Dyke - 25 S. Saginaw/ Detroit [hole] Pontiac\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The Warren store is gone from this piece, replaced with a store in Pontiac; and for the first time the cities, Detroit and Pontiac, appear on the piece. LDe has cataloged a 1958D piece that has the three addresses, but apparently only Pontiac on it. That does not make sense to me (as the other two addresses are nowhere near Pontiac), so I have not listed that piece in this catalog. Melin F B Co. Inc. is listed in the 1953 Dun and Bradstreet under Detroit, with a parenthetical, “also Pontiac.” BP \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FE-10. 1948D, H, holed at bottom. Felix’s Bar/ Choice Liquors – Wine – Beer// 10046 Gratiot/ WA. [hole] 4- 9806\\ KMAYWHGL. This must have been from a fairly large city to have a 7 digit phone number in 1949. By address and phone that large city must be Detroit. Felix Cafe is listed as a tavern in the 1953 D & B, and is listed at this address and with this phone no. in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FE-20. 1950D, H, holed at bottom. Federal-Mogul Picnic 1950// [hole]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Federal Mogul Corporation was founded in 1899 as the Muzzy-Lyon Co., originally specializing in metal work and in particular engine bearings. Its first location was as 56-58 Woodward Ave. in downtown Detroit. It operated under the Muzzy-Lyon name until a merger in 1924 when it became Federal Mogul Corp., a Michigan corporation. According to its website, it moved its corporate headquarters from Detroit to Southfield in 1966, where it remains today. It filed a chapter 11 bankruptcy petition in 2001 in order to resolve its asbestos liabilities and confirmed a chapter 11 plan of reorganization that created an asbestos trust under section 524(g) of the federal Bankruptcy Code in 2007. Although it is not known where exactly the 1950 picnic was held, corporate headquarters was in Detroit at that time and the picnic was probably in Detroit. JL \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FI-10. 1945, H. Dick Towne/ Boys’ Shop// Fintex [logo symbol looks like a hanger or a “7” with a horizontal line through it] Clothes\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. When this maverick piece came on for sale on eBay in July 2008, BP found an advertisement in the May 24, 1945 issue of the Grosse Pointe News for the grand opening of the new downtown Fintex store, which included the “Brand New Dick Towne Boys’ dept.” This made me think that almost all maverick businesses probably also advertised in newspapers and probably used the same logos and jingos that they used on encased pieces. Finding those advertisements, as Bob did here, could identify some otherwise hard to identify pieces. In addition, the advertisement made it clear that the business here was Fintex Clothes and that Dick Towne was just a department within that store, so that I knew to list it here under “FI.” EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FI-30. 1961 with 1940 half and 1961 quarter, 1961D dime, 1961 nickel and 1961 cent encased in RD plastic (called a “desk coaster” by eBay seller). In the center: First/ Federal/ Savings/ of Detroit. JL \$20

[ ] MI-DET-FL-10. 1929, RD,35mm. W.E. Flower/ Funeral Director/ Cedar 4170/ Detroit, Mich. LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FO-10. 1947, H, holed at top. Dan Fodor [hole] Photographer/ 8147 W. Jefferson// VI. 2-2525/ VI. 2-5150\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Dan Fodor is listed under Photographers, Commercial in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages, at this address, with phone VInewood 2-2525. JL \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FO-20. 1949D, RD, holed at bottom. Fort Clark Bar/ 4280 W. Fort St./ John Antishin [hole] Prop.\ KMANGB. According to Yahoo, 4280 W. Fort is just a bit west of downtown, at not far from the intersection of Fort and Clark. There is a Fort Clark Restaurant listed in the 1940 D & B. Fort Clark Bar is listed at the above address in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. John Antishin is on the Internet social security death index from Northville Michigan. EB, BP \$12

[ ] MI-DET-FO-30. 1950D, H, holed at bottom. Foodcraft Hamburgers// 8019 Schaefer Hwy./ Detroit [hole] Michigan\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in February 2011. EB \$10

[ ] MI-DET-FO-40. 1953D, RD,35mm. Fort Wayne Hotel/ 300 Fine Rooms// Detroit, Mich.\ KMANGB. There was a series of hotel pieces in the mid-50s, with a given number of fine rooms in each hotel. The Kemper Lane Hotel in Cincinnati also had 300 fine rooms (OH-CIN-KE-20); Cincinnati’s Metropole Hotel had 400 (OH-CIN-ME-30-34); Cincinnati’s Broadway Hotel had only 250 (OH-CIN-BR-12); the De Soto Hotel in St. Louis had 300 (MO-STL-DE-20); and the Hotel Knickerbocker in NYC had 400 (NY-NYC-KN-30). The largest of the fine room hotels was the Hotel Times Square with 1000 (NY-NYC-TI-10). EB, LDe \$8

[ ] MI-DET-FO-42. 1954D, RD,35mm. Same words as on the -40, but a different obverse die. On this piece, the “T” of Fort points down between the two zeroes in the number of rooms. On the -40, 1953D piece, it points to the first of the two zeroes. EB \$8

[ ] MI-DET-FO-44. 1956D, RD,32mm. Fort Wayne Hotel// Detroit, Michigan\ KMANGB. This is different piece than the -40 and -42 by words and size and a different piece than the -46 by a different reverse die. There are no common intersecting letters so that it is difficult to tell if the obverse dies are the same. I can see no differences and believe they are the same. On this reverse, the bar extends substantially to the left of “Never.” On the -46, it ends over the left side of the first “E” of Never. JL, LS, CK#183,C9 \$6

[ ] MI-DET-FO-46. 1959 or 1960D small, RD,32mm. Fort Wayne Hotel// Detroit, Michigan\ KMANGB. Looks like a Fankhauser encased, but it is not, as there is no Fankhauser signature. It must have been manufactured by Osborne Coinage Co. of Cincinnati, the same company who made the Fankhauser encased. This piece’s reverse even has the same die break/problems at about 7:30 where the encasement meets the cent that Bryan Ryker and I have

commented on in the Casement as common on many Fankhauser encased of the 60s. I do not know where the 1959 piece fits in. VN, LDe; JL, LS, LDe \$4

[ ] MI-DET-FO-48. 1960D, RD,32mm. Hotel Fort Wayne/ Detroit, Michigan. LDe, LS \$5

[ ] MI-DET-FO-50. 1962D, RD,32mm. Hotel Fort Wayne/ [two stars]/ Detroit Michigan. LDe \$5

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FO-60. 1954D, H, holed at bottom. Fortune Real Estate/ 9306 Woodward// TR. 1-8000\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This address on Woodward is in Detroit, south of Highland Park. This is listed at this address and phone number in the 1955 Detroit Yellow Pages. The Fortune Real Estate ad indicated “over 14 years of reliable service.” The invoice for this piece is in the Osborne orders, with invoice ordering 1000 pieces dated March 9, 1955, and delivered to Fortune at 9306 Woodward, “Detroit, Michigan.” This was an unlisted Michigan piece when I bought it on eBay in September 2010. JL, OR(4071) \$8

[ ] (MI)-DET-FR-10. 1946, H, holed at bottom. French Specialty Sales Co./ 5344 Crane// Detroit 13/ Plaza [hole] 5791\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in November 2009. Another appeared in December 2012, and again in April 2013. JL, EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-FR-20. 1955, RD,35mm. French Adv. Specialty Co.// TW. 3-7600/ Detroit 34 [hole]\ KMANGB. Very interesting. A 1955 without D is a very rare date for an encased piece, though not as rare as a 1956. I wonder if this is related to the French Specialty Sales Co. which put out the above piece in 1946. They do have different addresses and phone numbers. JL, EB \$15

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-FR-30. 1950s date, H, holed. Frank’s Super-Right Market/ 8626 Michigan Ave./ LU. 2-2184\ KMANGB/ IGBL. To date no actual sample of this piece has surfaced but it was ordered from Osborneshopped to Frank’s Market at the address on the piece in Detroit on June 12, 1950. OR(603) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GA-10. 1947, H, holed at bottom. Clothing Jewelry Furniture/ Worth 2.50 on 25.00 Purchase// Gate ly’s\ [hole]\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Although the hole is mostly below the name above, it still causes it to separate a bit where shown. Gately Shops, Inc. was listed in the 1942 and 1955 Detroit phone directories at 241 Michigan. It was listed in BP’s 1955 Dun & Bradstreet as an installment men’s and women’s clothing, furnishing, household goods and furniture store. A non-encased Gately’s token has been attributed to Detroit by the TAMS maverick program (no. 10078). JL, LDe, JR, RM#196,2019 \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GE-10. 1878S Morgan Dollar, RD brass. [dot each side] Motors Holding Division// General Motors Corporation\ [star each side] Merry Christmas [star] 1955// And a Happy New Year. This was an unlisted piece when it came on for sale on eBay in February 2017. A second came on for sale in April. Is there a hoard? It is similar to the Buick Flint pieces from 1940, (MI)-(FLI)-BU-10 through -14. EB \$75

[ ] MI-DET-GI-10. 1901, SH. Restaurant & Cafe Detroit, Mich// Gies’s [in script] \ KMANGB/ IBGL [type 3 rev.]. I saw a token for sale on eBay in 2003 for The Berghoff, “formerly

Gies's," opposite the Detroit Opera House and Temple Theatre, at 10-12-14 Monroe Ave. JL, EB, DG#66,411, LDe, LS (who reported a 1897 cent, but I am going to assume that the 1901 cent is the only correct original cent and the 1897 is not an original cent, unless and until I see it in person -- if original it must have been encased as a circulated cent) \$60

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GM-10. 1922 Peace Dollar, RD, black encasement, clear front with front of Peace Dollar showing through; in gold lettering on back: GMAC/ Sales Managers/ Meeting/ Sept. 22, 1960. GMAC was the finance wing of General Motors: "General Motors Acceptance Corp." It was listed in the 1955 Detroit directory at 1-264 General Motors Building, which is located at 3044 W. Grand Blvd., and now called the Cadillac Place. It was GM's headquarters building from the mid-1920s until 1996, when GM moved into the Renaissance Center, on the river. GMAC underwent much corporate change in the later 2000s when GM was having its financial troubles culminating in its chapter 11 bankruptcy filing. A 51% majority interest in the finance company was sold to Cerberus Capital in 2006, and then it became Ally Financial in 2010, still headquartered in Detroit in 2019. EB \$60

[ ] (MI)-DET-GO-10. 1901, W. The Goebel Brewing Co. Detroit.// Beer.\\ GLKMAP. EB, SH#9,816, KC \$80 (although this piece sold on eBay in February 2012 for \$342)

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GO-20. 1930, H. Goodman's Haberdashery/ [dot between two dashes]/ We Cash Your Pay Check// Corner Clay & Richmond Aves./ Buy Here and Save\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was a mystery for some time, as it appeared there was no intersection Clay and Richmond Aves. in the United States. LDe had attributed it to Detroit, but I did not have the information behind the attribution, and I do not attribute pieces without factual support. Because there is neither a Clay nor a Richmond Ave. in Detroit, I did not think it likely the piece was from Detroit. Yet it is. LS was reviewing a prior draft of this catalog and noticed this piece listed as unattributed in the maverick section and sent me a copy of the page from the 1929 Detroit directory showing "Goodman Bros mens furngs" at 1300 Clay, corner Richmond Ave. This verifies the piece absolutely. So, what happened to Clay and Richmond Aves.? In my 1949 Detroit postal directory, those streets are listed in zone 11. Zone 11 was just south of Hamtramck. Looking on the map, what is now just south of Hamtramck? -- the huge (multiple city blocks) GM Cadillac Assembly plant. LS told me that based on his 1978 map, Clay comes out of the plant going WSW and hits Richmond at the Chrysler freeway. Today there is a Clay Street, which is only about 7 blocks long (not the 20 or so it was in 1930) ending at the GM plant. Richmond Ave. is now gone and built over by the Chrysler freeway (I-75). I checked on Yahoo and 1600 Clay St. is indeed 3 blocks east of the freeway (which was 1300 Clay Ave. back in the old days). Thanks to LS for clearing up this old mystery. JL, LDe, EB \$10

This address is west of Telegraph and therefore must be in Redford, not Detroit. According to Yahoo, 23951 Fenkell is still east of Telegraph, but 25341 is west. Also according to Yahoo and the addresses of gas stations on this road, the street becomes known as Five Mile Road in Redford and Livonia. Because the piece itself says that the business is from Detroit, I will nonetheless follow what is on the piece. JL, LDe, JR \$10

[ ] MI-DET-GR-10. Brass medallion token encased in a RD, white metal encasement with wreath like extensions at the bottom and handles at the top. Grand Lodge Reunion July 11-17// Detroit Mich.\\ [there is nothing on the encasement rev. except the diemaker, Schwaab S & S Co.]. The medallion token says: I am not an Elk I am an Deer\\ [clock face reading 11:00 and showing 1910]. Interesting piece with a token encased instead of a coin. I guess it was to tell people when to show up at the reunion. JR \$30

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GR-20. 1916, H. Grand Jewelry Co./ 210 Grand River Ave. W./ Credit if Desired// Good for \$2.00 on Any/ Article Over \$10.00/ 15324 Livernois Ave.\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 210 Grand River is just at the start of Grand River near Woodward, downtown, a mere .2 miles from the Simmons & Clark Jewelry store. 15324 Livernois is about 5 miles north and a bit west of downtown, out near the University of Detroit campus. There was a chain of five Grand Jewelry Co., Inc. stores listed in the 1942 Detroit phone directory, none at these two addresses. PCMT, LDe \$25

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GR-30. 1927, RD,35mm. Gratiot Ave. Improvement Assn./ Tashmoo 1927// [curved line] Spend Your Money/ on Gratiot\\ KMAYWHGL. This piece has to be from Michigan, the question is what city to put it in. The Tashmoo Park was an old amusement park founded around 1900. It was located in the St. Clair flats, near Harsen's Island in the vicinity of Algonac on the northeast side of Lake St. Clair. It is often referred to in articles as a Detroit amusement park, a reference to the Detroit area and not the city itself. The Tashmoo river cruise ship was named after the park. It struck a submerged rock on June 18, 1936 but managed to dock so that passengers and crew could get off before it sank. Gratiot Ave. starts in downtown Detroit and goes out to Mt. Pleasant, generally following the Detroit River and the west shore of Lake St. Clair. My best guess is that the Gratiot Ave. Improvement Ass'n was in Detroit and had an outing in 1927 to Tashmoo Park, which this piece commemorated. Therefore, I have put it in Detroit. JL \$15

[ ] MI-DET-GR-40. 1947D or 1948, RD,35mm. Gratiot Chevrolet Co.// 12668 Gratiot Ave./ Detroit 5, Mich.\\ KMANGB. SH#17,830, LDe; JR, EB, BS#75,66 (listed in ACL without date) \$14

[ ] MI-DET-GR-50. 1948D, RD,35mm. Grand River/ Chevrolet Co.// 5100 Grand River/ Detroit 8, Mich.\\ KMANGB. This was an unlisted Michigan and Chevy piece when it came on for sale on eBay in July 2009. EB \$20

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GR-60. 1948, H. Gratiot-Fischer/ Service/ 8645 Gratiot/ Towing WA2-8904. 8645 Gratiot is six blocks NE of Van Dyke near I-94. Detroit had WALnut and WARwich exchanges that would match the WA. BP found Gratiot-Fischer Service listed as a service station established in 1943 in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet. It is listed at this address with this phone number in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages. It advertised "Minor Repairs – Tune-Up – Brakes – Sunoco Products." LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-GR-62. 1948D, H. Gratiot Fischer/ 8645 Gratiot/ Towing-WA 2-8904. LDe \$12

[ ] MI-DET/LIN/PLY-GR-70. 1952D, H, holed at bottom. Grand Jewelers/ 5 Stores to Serve You// Detroit/ Lincoln Park [hole] Plymouth\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in January 2019, and I bought it though it was not in great condition. JL \$10

[ ] MI-DET-GU-10. 1900 or 1901, SH. Gustav A. Moebs & Co. Makers, Detroit, Mich, U.S.A.// Pawnee/ 5¢ Cigars\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Both JR and LS report 1906 cents in this piece, JR reporting that his cent is in tight but he believes it is replaced. The only original cents known to me in the squat horseshoe piece are 1900-1903, mostly 1901. This piece has the type 3 reverse (see MI-BCR-NA-10 for a description of the reverses), not the type 1 that matches 1900 pieces. I believe 1901 is likely the only original cent. One of a very few U.S. encased pieces to have "U.S.A." on the piece, all towards the beginning of encased cent manufacture. LDe; JL, EB, DF(11/26/11), lot 618, TCn (sold for \$145 in 2003); JR, LS (both reporting 1906 cents, surely replaced) \$120

[ ] MI-DET-HA-10. 1907, RD, celluloid mirror. You Get this in Change for a \$10.00 Bill with One of/ [star each side] Hauger's \$9.99 Suits or Overcoats/ Good Luck to You in 1907// And All the Years to Follow/ 191 Gratiot Ave./ Detroit, Mich. So there is after all a Hauger mirror for Detroit. I didn't know of one until this piece came on for sale on eBay in August 2012. EB \$75

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HE-10. 1948, RD,35mm, holed at bottom. Heating Master Cooling/ Oil Coal Gas// 14200 E. Warren/ VA. [hole] 2-8181\ KMAYWHGL. This is a strange way to identify the Master Heating and Cooling Company, but that is what this piece means to me. Indeed, this business is listed under Master Heating in the 1942 Detroit phone directory at this address with phone LEnox - 8181. According to the Internet phone exchange website, LEnox become VALley 2 in the 1946 to 1948 Detroit main changeover to 7 digits. BP reports this was still listed under Master Heating & Cooling Co. in the 1955 Dun & Bradstreet. The -14 is a 1959D piece for Heating Kern's Appliance at this address with the same phone number. JL, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HE-12. 1956D, RD,35mm. This piece has the same obverse words as the -10, in the same orientation. However, it is a different obverse die, although the differences are slight. Here, the type of the phone number is the same size as the other letters on the piece, while on the -10, the phone number is noticeably larger than the other letters. In addition, the "2" of the phone number is under the right side of the "A" in Warren on this piece while it is between the "WA" on the -10. I have not seen this reverse to compare dies. EB, LDe \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HE-14. 1959D, RD, holed at bottom. Heating Kern's Appliance/ Televisions/ 14200 E. Warren/ VA 2-8181\ KMAYWHGL. The name on this one is strange, but perhaps not so much after looking at the above two pieces for "Heating Master Cooling." The 1958 Michigan Dun & Bradstreet has a listing for "Master Heater & Cooler Co. in the Distributors, Stockers and Appliances businesses. PCu \$8

[ ] MI-DET-HE-20. Unknown date probably early 1950s, RD, brass. Hettche Motor Sales Co.// 2475 W. Grand Blvd. at 14th\ Central Catholic High School// Detroit, Mich. The eBay piece

had a 1952D cent in it, but it did not look like it was in all the way. This is a strange combination with the High School and the automotive company. Hettche Motor Sales is indeed listed at 2475 W. Gd. Blvd. in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages as a Ford dealer. EB \$20 (with original cent)

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HI-10. 1947, H, holed at top. Hi-Lo [hole] Bar/ Liquor – Beer & Wine// 3501 Greusel/ TA. 5-9245\ KMANGB/ IBGL. There sure were a lot of Detroit bars that made pieces in the late 1940s, many of them mavericks. This one is almost certainly Detroit by address – a google map search for 3501 Greusel turns up only Detroit. Plus, Tashmoo 5- is a Detroit exchange (see (MI)-(DET)-CL-20 and (MI)-(DET)-ST-70), and Detroit was probably one of only a handful of places that had 7 digit phone numbers in 1947 or 1948. I found 27 taverns through the “F”s in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages whose phone number began Tashmoo 5-9xxx, including Club Bar (see (MI)-(DET)-CL-20)). JL, EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HO-10. 1946D or 1948, H. Horvath Bar// 7917 West Jefferson\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This address is on the west side at W. End Street and Dearborn Street, in an industrial area with lots of railroad tracks. There are lots of bars in this area still in 2002. Frank Horvath is listed as owning a beer garden, and John Horvath a restaurant and beer garden in the 1940 D & B. LDe, JR; EB (wrong picture posted) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-HT-10. 1948D, RD, 35mm. H & T Cleaners// 432 Theodore/ Terrace 2-9048\ KMANGB. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when SH brought it on for sale on eBay in February 2017, attributing it to Detroit from phone number and address listed in 1930s Detroit Free Press editions.

[ ] MI-DET-HW-10. 1928, H. Good for 10% Discount on All Purchases/ [star each side] The H.W. Mc Cullough Co.// Jewelers & Optometrists/ 3339 Gratiot at Mack/ Detroit, Mich.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Gratiot at Mack is just a bit NE of downtown. Unlike the Simmons and Clark store ((MI)-DET-SI-10 and -12) which is still in business, there is no longer a jewelry store at Gratiot and Mack. This is a fairly common piece. JL, EB, TC, PCMT, DF, BS#35,14, BS#75,257, KK198, LDe \$18

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JA-10. 1928, H. Good for \$1.00 on any Purchase/ of \$10.00 or Over/ Jay and Jay/ [small star each side of the cent]// Men’s Wear/ 9654 Gratiot Ave./ 6486 Chene St.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. These two addresses are about 3 miles apart in Detroit. 9654 Gratiot is just north of the Ford Freeway, I-94 and so is 6486 Chene St., a bit to the west. 6486 Chene Street today looks like it is either in or near the GM Cadillac Assembly Plant. I called the Hamtramck mayor’s office and learned that Chene Street on the south side of the GM plant is in Detroit. After the GM plant, the continuation of what is Chene Street in Detroit becomes Jos. Campau Boulevard in Hamtramck. LS reports that the 1928 Detroit city directory lists Jay & Jay under men’s furnishings at both addresses. Jacob Levy and Jacob Israel were the proprietors. JL, EB \$25

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JA-20. 1948, H, holed at bottom. Jay Furniture Co./ Good for \$2.50 on Purchase// LO. 7-2506/ 2111 [hole] Gratiot\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 2111 Gratiot is on the near east side, near Chene, a half mile or so before Gratiot meets Mack. According to the phone exchange website, there was a Lorain extension in Detroit. Today, the phone number of Burger King at 2155 Gratiot starts with 567- (the same as LO 7). Based on all that I would believe this business must have been in Detroit. Yet, it is not listed in either the 1940 or 1953 D & B. This is an extremely

unusual piece in that it is the only horseshoe type like this from the 40s that I know of that is a good for piece. EB \$20

[ ] MI-DET-JE-10. 1948, RD,35mm. Jerry McCarthy Chevrolet Co.// 440 Burroughs Ave./ Detroit 2, Mich.\\ KMANGB. The 440 and Ave. extend beyond the beginning and the end of the top line. JL, JR, EB, LDe, ACL \$14

[ ] MI-DET-JE-20. Unknown date, probably late 50s, RD,32mm. Pro-Tek-Tiv Shoes/ Jerome's Shoes/ 18117 Wyoming - at Curtis - Detroit, Mich. LDe reported a 1934 cent with a question mark. This is almost certainly part of the late 1950s Pro Tek Tiv series. See, MI-TRE-NA-10 (1959D). 18117 Wyoming is 3 1/2 blocks north of 6 Mile Road, just S of Curtis. LDe \$8 (with original cent)

[ ] MI-DET-JE-22. 1962D, RD,32mm. Pro Tek Tiv Shoes/ Jerome's Shoes/ [small open center star on each side of the cent]// 18117 Wyoming/ Detroit, Mich.\\ KMANGB. There were quite a few Pro Tek Tiv shoe encased, probably enough to make it a series, but most were from 1958 and 1959. See, MI-TRE-NA-10. This 1962 looks a bit different than the others in the series, with both the brand and the store above the cent. My guess is that the -20 piece was a 1958 or 1959 piece and that the merchant decided to make another a few years later. JL \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JO-10. 1925, RD. Joy Oil Co., Your Home Co. BP found Joy Oil Co. listed in the 1942 Detroit phone book at 3949 Puritan. He also did a google search for Joy Oil Co. and the only reference to that company is to a Michigan company. AM(505) \$12

See (MI)-DET-SO-10 and -12 for pieces for "Joe Solner, Inc.," one of which is first listed for "Solner Investment Inc."

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JO-20. 1946, H, holed at top. Joey's [hole] Stables/ 8800 W. Jefferson// Finest Foods & Liquors/ VI. 2-9550\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Listed in the 1942 Detroit phone directory at 8800 W. Jefferson, phone VInewood 2-9550. Still listed in BP's 1955 Dun & Bradstreet as a restaurant that does not serve liquor (maybe it lost its liquor license between 1946 and 1955). Detroit completed its changeover to 7 digits between 1946 and 1948, although I thought it was closer to 1948 based on other pieces. EB, LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JO-30. 1950D or 1952D, H, holed at bottom. Joe Scudiere Inc./ Studebaker// 12300 E. Jefferson/ VA [hole] 2-5151\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Listed in BP's 1955 Dun & Bradstreet under Scudiere Joe Inc., as a new/used car dealership established in 1950. See, (MI)-(DET)-ST-50 for a 1947 piece for Stotts Murphy Studebaker at the same address and with the same phone number. In 2002, this address is right in the middle of the Daimler Chrysler Jefferson Assembly plant, just at the east end of Detroit, before Grosse Point Park. See (MI)-(DET)-HE-10, -12 and -14 for another VA phone number (Valley) on the east side. I have not seen the 1950D to compare dies. LDe; EB \$14

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JU-10. 1947, H, holed at bottom. Jumbo's Bar/ 3736-3rd St.// TE. 2-9868/[hole]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Listed at this address but with phone number TEmple 1-8949 in the 1955 yellow pages, with Steve DeMoff listed as proprietor. It had entertainment on the week-ends. VN \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-JU-12. 1948, H, holed at bottom. Jumbo's Bar/ 3736 3rd St.// TE. 2- [hole] 9868\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Obvious differences from the -10 include the location of the hole here between the phone number, no dash between the address and the street and the obverse letters are larger on this piece than on the -10. VN \$10

[ ] MI-DET-KA-10. 1928, H. Good for 10% Discount on Purchase/ Harry J. Kahn/ Jeweler/ 438 Gratiot Ave./ Detroit, Mich. LDe \$25

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KA-20. 1962D, H, holed at bottom. Kal Packing Co./ Wholesale Meats// T.E. 2-5878/ 7915 [hole] Riopelle St.\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. The 2003 eBay seller said this was Detroit by address and phone. In addition, Kal Packing Co. is listed in the 1960 D & B in the meat business, having begun in 1955. Kal Packing Co. is indeed listed under Meat Wholesalers in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages but at 2602 Orkens, Woodward 2-0917. The seller was right about the phone no. and address: (1) there are plenty of other Detroit pieces listed here with TE 2- phone numbers (MI)-DET-DE-40, for example), and (2) according to Yahoo, 7915 Riopelle Street is a Detroit address. JL \$8

[ ] MI-DET-KE-10. 1948, H, holed at bottom. Alec Keller Motor Sales/ 19901 Livernois// UN. 1-5171/ Detroit [hole] Mich.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in December 2005. JL \$12

[ ] (MI)-DET/INK-KE-20. 1967, H, holed at bottom. Kelly Furniture Mart// [in two lines to the bottom left] 18045 Livernois/ Detroit [in two lines to the bottom right] 29865 Mich. Ave./ Inkster\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. Michigan Avenue in Inkster is U.S. Route 12. JL \$8

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KI-10. Any date, RD,40mm, green cardboard. Put-a- Penny Coin/ Put-a-Penny Co. Rochester, N.Y./ Pat. U.S.A. 2027667 Pat. Canada 354336/ [big star each side]// Insert One Cent/ Return to Store/ Kinsels Drug Stores\ nothing on the reverse. The Put a Penny series seemed to concentrate on drug stores. There were People's, Mykrantz, Muir (see (MI)-(GRA)-MU-10), Marshall's (see (OH)-(CLE)-MA-10) and probably others. The cent was not struck in, instead it just fits into the cardboard and was intended to be replaced. Any cent can be in there now. The piece was probably put out in the late 30s. According to the Michigan business identification website, Kinsel Drug Stores, Inc. qualified in 1958 and went out of business in 1981. The original Kinsel Drug Store was at Michigan and Griswold in downtown Detroit and there are pictures of it on the Internet from a long time ago, one from the Detroit News, with a photo of the store, from around the mid 20s. Kinsels was the first 24 hour drug store in the country. Twelve stores are listed in the 1942 Detroit phone directory and it was still listed in BP's 1955 Dun & Bradstreet. EB, LDe \$4

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KO-10. 1919S, RD,35mm. Koppin Theatre// Always the Best\ KMAYWHGL. A search on the Internet for Koppin Theatre reveals only the one in Detroit. There are references to bookings and ads from 1923 to 1927, including Bessie Smith and the Whitman Sisters and Company. LS found the following listing in his 1921 Detroit directory: "Koppin Theatre, Henry E. Koppin, mgr., 528-30 Gratiot Ave." This verifies the piece as much as possible (even the Theatre is spelled the same way). JL, EB (with crude hole) \$20

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KO-20. 1946, H. Used Cars/ No. 9529// 11601 Livernois/ Kowalk Motor Sales\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The address screams Detroit. Yet, when I first saw this piece, I could not find it in either my 1940 or 1953 D & B and Bob Perdue could not find it in his 1942 Detroit directory. I wondered if the No. 9529 could mean this was a sample item and that the merchant might be a fantasy of the maker. But BP persisted and found Law and Kowalk in the used car business at 11601 Livernois in the 1942 directory. Indeed, following up on Bob's work, I then found Law and Kowalk in the Used Car business in my 1940 D & B. Law must have retired between 1942 and 1946, and the business was gone by 1953. I suspect that No. is the phone exchange and does not stand for number (see (MI)-(DET)-WH-20 describing Northlawn as a Detroit exchange). This became absolute when the -22 surfaced on eBay in September 2019. JL, EB \$15

[ ] (MI)-DET-KO-22. 1946, H, holed at top. [hole]/ Kowalk Motor Sales Detroit// 11601 Livernois Ave./ No. 9529\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The eBay discovery piece had a "P" punched into where the encasement obverse meets the cent reverse both left and right. EB \$ 15

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KO-30. 1947 or 1948, H, holed at top. Kotzen [hole] Motors/ Studebaker// 13111 Dexter Blvd./ WE. 3-2700\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Dexter Boulevard seems interchangeable with Dexter Ave. (see MI-DET-DE-30, the Dexter Chevrolet piece from the same time period, at 11534 Dexter). Detroit has a Webster exchange, which would match the WE. Listed in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet under Kotzen Motors, Inc. as a motor vehicle dealer, started in 1948. I have not seen the 1948 to compare dies. JL; LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KO-32. 1950D, H, holed at top. Same words as on the -30 but a different obv. die. Here the hyphen in the phone number is located directly under the "T" in Dexter above it. On the -30, it is under the "X." EB \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KO-40. 1961D, RD,32mm. Milton Kort/ [six sided star with a circle on each side of the cent]// Magician\\ KMANGB. The Internet has many reports about the Detroit pharmacist turned magician, Milton Kort. There are at least two books about him and his magic, one by Magic, Inc. called "Kort Is Now in Session," another by Stephen Minch called, "The Magic of Milt Kort." He rarely traveled outside the Detroit area and did not perform at magician's conventions, but the greats in magic came to Detroit to see him perform. The Osborne records reflect that this piece was shipped to him at "7844 Spathfield" in Detroit. I cannot really value these magician pieces as I am not a collector of magic exnumia, so this price is just a guess, based on the BS selling price. A 1945 encased cent for Henry Gordien, Magical Humorist, Minneapolis, sold for \$137.50 plus 10% in BS#51,122. The BS piece sold for \$48.40. JL, EB, BS#65,89, OR(14231) \$50

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KR-10. 1948, H. Kramer Bros. Freight Lines\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Kramer Brothers Freight Lines, Inc. was founded in 1922 and headquartered in Detroit. There is a picture of one of their trucks on the Internet, with Detroit and Est. 1922 on it. A legal search shows ten legal cases involving Kramer Bros. Freight Lines Inc., including one from 1959 in the Michigan Supreme Court, which states that Kramer Bros. is a Michigan corporation and one from 1945 in the Common Pleas Court of Cambria County, Pennsylvania, which also states that Kramer Bros is a Michigan corporation doing business in Pennsylvania. "Kramer Bros Freight Lines Inc" is listed under Detroit in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet. It is also listed at 4195 Central in the 1955 Detroit

yellow pages. VN has attributed this piece to Pittsburgh in the Penna. encased catalog, but the Michigan attribution is correct. BP \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-KR-12. 1949s, H. Kramer Bros. Freight Lines Inc. This piece was ordered from Osborne on February 16, 1950 to be shipped to a novelty company in Detroit. OR(325) \$10

[ ] MI-DET-LA-10. 1901, RD,35mm. [beading around the outside of the encasement] Lambert & Lowman// [curved line] Manufacturing Chemists/ Detroit, Mich.\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. JR, LDe (listed a 1911 perhaps a typo?) \$30

[ ] (MI)-DET-LA-20. 1939 or 1945, H. Lasky/ Furniture// 13300 Jos. Campau/ at Davison/ Detroit/ [small bird in each corner] \\ KMANGB/ IBGL. According to Yahoo, this address is in Hamtramck. That has taught me that I have to be careful because the Internet is often wrong. I called the Hamtramck city offices and learned that this address does have a Hamtramck zip code (which is how Yahoo works) but that the Hamtramck/Detroit boundary on Joseph Campau Street is at Carpenter, so that Davison is indeed in Detroit. The person I talked to remembered Lasky Furniture and reported that the building is still there, though Lasky is no longer in business. In 2001, the business at 13300 Jos. Campau in Detroit is called "Furniture Express Clearance." According to LDe, the 1945 piece is the same as the 1939, and the obverse dies are indeed the same. That is very rare in pieces with dates 4 years apart. I have not seen the 1945 reverse to compare dies. JL, LDe, CK,1996 ATCO, 2118; EB, LDe \$12

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LA-30. 1947, H, holed at bottom. Charles Lada & Son/ 8032 W. Jefferson Ave.// VI. [hole] 2-9122. This is on the southwest side, near Joey's Stables ((MI)-(DET)-JO-10) at 8800 W. Jefferson, which also had the VI 2 exchange. There is a Charles Lada listed with two residences in the 1942 Detroit phone directory. Lada Vending Service is listed in the 1953 D & B. JL, LDe \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-LE-10. 1945, RD,35mm. LeRoy Jewelers// Diamonds-Watches/ 51 Monroe Ave. - Detroit\\ KMAYWHGL. This location is right downtown near Woodward and Michigan, where the new Detroit baseball park is located. According to Yahoo, today it is Monroe St. not Monroe Ave. However, LS reports that LeRoy Jewelers was listed in the 1940 Detroit city directory at 51 Monroe Ave. I wonder if that was in a different place. LDe, EB \$10

[ ] (PA)-PIT/(MI)-DET-LI-10. 1934, H. Linkmans Gavel Club - Past Noble Grands Ass'n/ Detroit/ to// Pittsburgh/ Sept. 29 - 30 - 1934\\ Rebekahs and Odd Fellows Reception Comm./ of/ Western// Pennsylvania/ 1934. JL, BS#51,66 \$20

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-20. 1947, H, holed at bottom. You Always Pay Less at/ Lincoln Linoleum// 16900 W. McNichols/ VE. [hole] 8-0180\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. McNichols, sometimes called 6 Mile Road, is in Detroit. This address is just east of the Southfield Freeway. The cent obverse faces the encasement obverse on this and on the -22 piece. BP found Lincoln Rug & Linoleum Co. listed in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet as from Detroit with branches in other cities. In thd 1955 Detroit yellow pages, there are 5 locations, including 1824 E. 8 mile rd. JL, TH \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-22. 1948 or 1948D, H, holed at bottom. The obverse has the same words as on the -20, but a different die. Here, the "Y" of You points down to the right side of the "C" in

Lincoln. On the -20, it points to the middle of the first “N.” I have not seen this reverse to compare dies and have not seen the 1948D. JL, EB, EK, LDe; LS \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-24. 1949 or 1949D, H, holed at top. You Always [hole] Pay Less At/ Lincoln Rug & Linoleum// 16900 W. McNichols/ 1824 E. 8 Mi. Rd./ 1506 S. Fort St.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 1506 S. Fort is on the southwest side of Detroit near the Schaefer Highway. 1824 E. Eight Mile Road is right on the border of Oakland and Macomb counties. At this point, the odd numbers are on the north side of the street and the evens on the south, i.e., in Detroit, in contrast to the numbers on W 8 Mile Road where the reverse is true (see (MI)-(SOU)-DE-10). There is a gas station in 2001 at 1830 E. 8 Mile Road and Yahoo says it is in Detroit. The odd numbers are in Ferndale and Hazel Park. EB, RH, LDe, OR(164) (with comment that the 5000 pieces “must be in Detroit by Dec. 4”); JL, BS#75,256 \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-26. Probably 1950D like the -28, H, holed likely at top like the -28. You Always Pay Less at Lincoln Rug Linoleum, 1600 W. McNichols, VE 8-0180. This has the same single address as on the -20 and -22 but now the business is “Lincoln Rug Linoleum” not just “Lincoln Rug.” The Osborne order from March 26, 1951 refers to a “new die.” OR(1246) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-28. 1950D, H, holed at top. You Always Pay Less At [hole] Lincoln Rug Linoleum// 1500 Fort/ WA8-8778\ KMANGB/IBGL. JL, OR(1247) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-30. Probably 1950D like the -28, H, holed likely at top like the -28. You Always Pay Less at Lincoln Rug Linoleum, 1824 E. 8 Mile Rd., FO 6-1940. OR(1248) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(DET)-LI-32, Probably 1950D like the -28, holed likely at top like the -28. You Always Pay Less at Lincoln Rug Linoleum, 15590 Gratiot, DR 1-1220. Following the single piece for three stores in 1949, the customer ordered four separate pieces, including each of the three stores from the 1949 piece plus one more, this Gratiot store, in 1951. This location is just south of Eight Mile Road. OR(1249) \$10

[ ] (MI)-DET-LU-10. 1946, H, holed at bottom. Stop at the Lucky Number/ Good Used Cars// 11711 Livernois/ TE 4-0630 [hole] Detroit\ KMANGB/ IBGL. I am not sure if this might be a piece without the business name on it, or if the name of the business that ordered it was really “Lucky Number.” BP noticed that the address has 3 dice lucky numbers in it, 11 7 and 11 again, and so Lucky Number was probably the actual name of the business. However, BP found nothing under “Lucky Number” or at this address in the 1942 Detroit directory, and I found nothing listed under “Lucky Number” in the 1955 Detroit yellow pages under Used Cars, although there are many used car dealers on Livernois, including Joe Solner at 11515 Livernois (see (MI)-DET-SO-10 and -12), and lots with phone numbers that begin with TEXas 4-, on Livernois and Grand River. The President of the corporation was from Detroit and the Annual Meeting was to be held in Detroit on the first Wednesday in May. Detroit has the TRinity and TRiangle phone exchanges and MI-DET-ST-30, Stanton's Service at 8400 Woodward has phone no. TR 2-9590, which location is only about ¾ of a mile north of where 29 E. Baltimore is in Detroit. Joseph S. Smith is listed in the tavern business in my 1953 D & B. The final nail was found by Bob Perdue who located 25 Club at this address in his 1942 Detroit directory, thus absolutely attributing this piece to Detroit. According to the Internet phone exchange website, Tashmoo is a Detroit exchange, which had, after the switch to seven numbers in 1948, a 5 and a 6 as its third numbers. There is a 1999 Michigan environmental clean up bill on the Internet, and among gas stations that need to be cleaned up is one in Wayne county, "Stonik Service." BP found reference to Stonik John H Service in the 1955 Dun & Bradstreet, although according to the 1955 Detroit yellow pages, his station was on 8007 W. Warren. and handled Mobil. EB, LDe \$15

### **Introduction to the Souvenir of Detroit series**

There may not be as many pieces in the souvenir of Detroit series as there are in the Washington D.C. or Niagara Falls souvenir series, and also not as many as there are in the Souvenir of New York City series, but Detroit is probably the next city after those three. I have organized these pieces by shapes -- so that the chamberpots are the -10 series, the horseshoes the -20 and so on, except that later pieces start new series again.

This address is on the northwest side of Detroit, near Fenkell (5 mile road). **Dowagiac** (30 miles SW of Kalamazoo, 15 miles N of the Indiana border)

LS sent me an advertisement from his 1901 Michigan Gazetteer for Dowagiac Grain Drills, claiming they were: "The largest exclusive manufacturers of Grain Seeding Machinery in the World." EB, SA#4,1838 \$50

[ ] MI-DOW-HA-10. 1964, RD,32mm. Bob Hartsell// Antiques/ Box 181 Dowagiac, Mich.\ KMANGB. BR, JL, LDe \$3

[ ] MI-DOW-HE-10. 1948S, RD,35mm. Herman's Town Tavern/ 115 S. Front St.// Dowagiac, Mich./ Television & Shuffleboard\ KMANGB. Pretty early for television, though not for shuffleboard. JL, EB, LDe \$18

[ ] MI-DOW-KU-10. 1948, H. Kurt & Hook's/ Friendly Service/ Phone 7374/ Dowagiac Michigan\ KMANGB/ IBGL. LS \$12

[ ] MI-DOW-RO-10. 1904 or 1906, RD,38mm. Compliments of/ Rowe & Canfield// Dry Goods & Carpets/ Dowagiac, Mich.\ GLKMAP/ [Whitehead & Hoag signature]. LDe listed this piece but without knowing the date. PC#21,653, EB, BP; LS, PC1 \$40

[ ] MI-DOW-TO-10. 1938, H. Tom's Town Tavern// 115 S. Front St./ Dowagiac, Mich.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when it came on for sale on eBay in September 2008. JL \$18

**Drayton Plains** (fairly large town, population 18,000 according to the Rand McNally Atlas, 5 miles NW of Pontiac)

There is also a 1957D piece for Neels Shoe Store, MI-ROS-NE-10, with the same address, 5028 Dixie Hwy., but in Roseville, Mich. This makes no sense as there is no Dixie Highway in Roseville (a suburb of Detroit). On the other hand, Neels-Ochs Shoe Store, Inc. is listed in Roseville and not in Drayton Plains in the 1958 Dun & Bradstreet. JL, LDe \$12

**Durand** (15 miles SW of Flint)

**East Detroit, now known as Eastpointe** (between Warren and St. Clair Shores). At a local referendum held in the summer of 1992, East Detroit officially changed its name to Eastpointe, so that it would no longer have to be associated by name with Detroit.

Eastpointe is just north of 8 Mile Road, which is the boundary between Wayne and Macomb/Oakland counties and thus between Detroit and its northern suburbs. Eight Mile Road stretches so far west it even forms the boundary between neighboring Washtenaw and Livingston counties north of Ann Arbor, more than 40 miles to the west.)

See Detroit for MI-DET-EA-20, a 1947 H piece for Eastwood Park, an amusement park just north of the Detroit border and thus actually located in East Detroit, but I list in under Detroit, because the park itself put "Detroit, Mich." on the piece.

[ ] MI-EDE/SCS-FI-01. 1946, RD,35mm, holed at bottom. First State Bank/ East Detroit/ St. Clair [hole] Shores, Mich.\ KMANGB. Because the Fankhauser piece has already been cataloged with the number -10, I have started the earlier pieces out with lower numbers. This piece does not say "29th Year." Different die than the -02, 1955D in that the hole here is between the city, not below it as on the -02. JL, EB, LDe, PCu \$10

[ ] MI-EDE/SCS-FI-08. 1960D, small date, RD,35mm, holed at bottom. Same words as on the -07, 1959D, but a different die, although with the same 43rd Year and 1917-1960. On this piece, the “I” of Detroit is under the left leg of the “A” in Bank. On the -07, it is under the “B.” JL, LDe \$5

[ ] MI-EDE/SCS-FI-09. 1960D, large date, RD,35mm, holed at bottom. First State Bank/ East Detroit/ 1917 [cent] 1961// 44th Year/ St. Clair [hole] Shores, Mich.\\ KMANGB. This piece was for the same anniversary year as the Fankhauser, but was the larger size like all of the preceding pieces and an earlier date. JL, LDe \$5

[ ] (MI)-EDE/SCS-FI-10. 1961D, RD,32mm. First State Bank/ East Detroit/ 1917 1961 [to left and right of cent]/ 44th Year/ St. Clair Shores\\ KMANGB. This bank still exists in 2000, now calling itself FirstState, only one word, with two capital letters, in the modern fashion. I saw an amazing extension of the new principle recently -- the first name of an attorney in Columbus is now AshLee (I cannot imagine that was what it was when she was born). The bank now has more than 80 years of community service and has branches in Eastpointe and St. Clair Shores, according to its website, [www.thefsb.com](http://www.thefsb.com). Because this piece lists East Detroit first (and the website lists Eastpointe first too), I have cataloged this piece under East Detroit. I suspect that Bryan Ryker listed this under St. Clair Shores, the second city on this piece, because by 1995 he could not find any “East Detroit” on the map.

It looks like Earl Fankhauser managed to obtain this bank’s account in the last year of its encased advertising. That is why the other pieces are all 35mm, while this piece is in the Fankhauser/Osborne 32mm style.

In his catalog, Bryan Ryker noted that this piece has the reverse rotated 180 degrees, so that the cent reverse is upside down compared to the encasement obverse writing. In his article, “Fankhauser Fun” in issue 19 of the Casement, Bryan reported that the owner of one of these pieces had told Bryan that his piece was holed. There is indeed room on this piece for a hole between the “Clair” and the “Shores,” like the holes on the pieces before this one. Bryan speculated that the reason that the encasement was rotated 180 degrees was so that the hole would go through the clover on the reverse, rather than through the word “Never.” I believe that he is

correct in that. This is supported by the fact that all the pieces made for this institution before this one were holed. BR, LDe \$3

[ ] MI-EDE-ME-10. 1948D, RD,35mm. Merollis Chevrolet/ Sales & Service// 21800 Gratiot Ave./ East Detroit, Mich.\ KMANGB. Merollis is still in business under the same name and at the same address in January 2000, although the city is now called "Eastpointe." The reason it is fairly rare that the same Chevy dealerships that issued encased in the 1947/48 promotion are still in business today is that most dealerships are individually owned and named after their owners. The people who owned the dealerships in the late 40s are no longer with us. VN, ACL \$16

**East Lansing** (home of Michigan State University, just northeast of Lansing)

[ ] (MI)-ELA-EA-10. 1956D, RD,35mm. East Lansing State Bank// 1916-1956\ 40 Years of Service// 1916-1956. PM reports that the East Lansing State Bank was chartered on May 31, 1916. This seems to be a very common piece. JL, PM, EB, MR, SA#59,1068, LDe, PCu \$5

see Lansing for (MI)-LAN/CHA/ELA-SH-10-14 and (MI)-LAN/ELA-SH-16 and -18.

**Ecorse** (near S suburb of Detroit, on the Detroit River)

[ ] MI-ECO-PL-10. Unknown date, RD,35mm. Priscilla Ware, The Guaranteed Aluminum, Is Sold By A.J. Plourde Hardware, 4084 W. Jefferson Ave. PC offered with a 1903 cent that he said may have been replaced. This could possibly be an Indian cent date, as I believe Leye Aluminum, owner of Priscilla Ware was in business in the early 1900s. PC2 (depends on date)

**Edwardsburg** (about 5 miles E of Niles, Mich., 10 miles NE of South Bend, Ind.)

[ ] MI-EDW-UP-10. 1948S, RD,35mm. Uptown Tavern// Edwardsburg, Mich.// Mom Haven and the Kids\ KMANGB. LDe, EB \$15

**Elmira** (about 50 miles S of Mackinaw, just a bit W of Gaylord)

[ ] (MI)-ELM/MCL/GAY-ST-10. 1909 Lincoln, RD,35mm. I Want Your Potatoes// F.J. Stafford/ Elmira Mancelona Gaylord\ KMANGB. These three cities are close together in the upper lower peninsula. DF, NTCA sale, 5/2010 lot 773 \$30

**Escanaba** (Upper Peninsula city, on Lake Michigan, about 50 miles NW of the Wisconsin border)

LS reports that the 1901 Michigan Gazetteer lists John Johnson and Jacob Miller as saloon operators in Escanaba. Therefore this Johnson cannot be the same as Billy Johnson in the MI-ESC-JO-10 piece, although they might have been relatives. PM \$60

The Fair Savings Bank/ Escanaba – Michigan// [star each side] This Coin/ Worth \$3.00 in Trade/ See Other Side\\ [star each side] Use this Coin to Get/ [star each side] A \$3.00 Hat Free// With Every Suit/ You Buy \$15/-- and Over. A puzzling piece. Where was the owner supposed to buy the suit. And who would give him the hat? I cannot imagine it was the Fair Savings Bank. There must have been an unnamed collaborator. The piece came with 1913 cent, and I think that is probably the right date as other pieces show \$15 for a suit was the price before WWI. EB \$40

[ ] MI-ESC-JO-10. 1902, H. [5 stars on each side] Good for 5¢ in Trade/ Billy Johnson's Place/ Escanaba, Mich.\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. PCMT, LDe \$80

[ ] MI-ESC-LI-10. 1901, H. [teardrops in design above and below the following]: [diamond design each side] Lion Sample Room// Escanaba, Mich/ Nels Ahlquist, Prop./ [bird design in each corner]\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. JL, SH#14,705, DG#102,12, LDe \$60

### **Farmington Hills** (NW Detroit suburb, N of Livonia and W of Southfield)

Marvin's Marvelous Mechanical Museum// Farmington Hills/ Mich., USA\\ KMANGB// [small horseshoe, small clover, very small signature "RWM," another small horseshoe and another small clover]. 1995D and 1993D dies look the same with the "T" of Farmington pointing down to the period in Mich. below. I think the cents may have been put in after striking, my cent is loose in the '83D piece. JL; JL, EB, PCu (reporting 1972D and 1984 cents); EB \$5

Marvin Yagoda, a 60 year old pharmacist with a hobby, started this museum in 1990, according to the museum's website. Its main attraction is vintage coin operated oddities.

This is a very unusual piece, unlike no other that I have seen. The cent in my piece was not struck with the encasement, it will move and come out with pressure. Either it is a replaced cent, which I believe unlikely as the museum was not founded until 1990 and a cent had no value worth punching out for in the 1990s, or the encasement was struck first and the cent simply inserted, or the piece was poorly manufactured and the cent not struck tightly. I would guess the last idea is right, as the piece was probably struck by someone who had little or no experience in striking encased pieces, likely even Mr. Yagoda himself. The cent does fit very tightly and no light shows through when the piece is held with a light source behind it. AA#10,m-25 is reported with a 1972D cent, 18 years before this museum started -- that is either replaced or was circulated when the piece was made.

### **Farwell** (middle of the state, about 80 miles N of Lansing)

See, MI-(DET)-PE-10 for the story of the Pere Marquette -- the line actually went from Flint to Ludington, probably through Saginaw. K & D is no longer in business; the only furniture store in town in January 2000 is Bud's New & Used Furniture. BP did find this business in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet. JL, EB, LS, VN, LDe \$5

**Fenton** (15 miles S of Flint on U.S. 23)

see Flint for (MI)-FLI/FEN-FI-10.

[ ] MI-FEN-PE-10. 1964, RD,32mm. Jack Pellett// Fenton, Mich./ 219 Hillview Terrace\\ KMANGB. According to Bryan Ryker, Pellett sold clothing. BR, JL, LDe \$3

**Flint** (60 miles N NW of Detroit on I-75)

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-BU-10. 1879 or 1879S Morgan or 1924 Peace Dollar, RD,49mm, brass. When Better Automobiles Are Built// Buick Will Build Them\\ “You Can Put Your Bottom Dollar on 1940”// [this line in cursive writing] “Real” Quality. This is part of the General Motor series of 1940, which included mostly Canadian coins. The 1879 piece was sold with its original box, which was a plain cardboard box with a blue top and red bottom (3 inches square), and a small blue ribbon in the slot to help remove the piece. EB; KK512; EB \$100

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-BU-12. 1879, 1883, 1890O, 1897O, 1899O, 1900O Morgan or 1922, 1924 or 1934 Peace Dollar, RD,49mm, brass. When Better Automobiles are Built, Buick Will Build Them\\ You Can Put Your Bottom Dollar on 1940// [this line in cursive writing] “Red” Curtice. Here instead of the “Real” Quality at the bottom, it says, Red Curtice. Harlow “Red” Curtice headed up the Buick Motor division from 1933 to 1952, when he became president of General Motors. He retired in 1958. He was named Time Magazine Man of the Year in 1955. He resided in Flint throughout his career. I have not cataloged to Michigan the Canadian 1940 series, which includes an encased Canadian dollar, with similar wording to this piece, except that the Canadians “Bet” their bottom dollar, not “Put” and the person at the bottom is H.J. Carmichael (for an example of the Canadian piece, see DG#100,1110). According to an Internet site, H.J. Carmichael was President and General Manager of General Motors of Canada Limited until 1942 when he left to assume control of all manufacturing for the Canadian government in the war effort. I really do not understand the timing of the Canadian piece – GM Canada was on a full out war effort in 1940 and I cannot believe that they were selling many, if any, automobiles to consumers. It may be that the U.S. operations were making encased pieces and made some for the Canadians too. This may have been given out at the 1939-1940 New York City World’s Fair. EB; EB; EB; JL; EB; Heritage 2/14-17/07 Long Beach Tokens and Medals Auction, lot 716; EB; PK(3/31/97), lot 311; EB \$100

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-BU-14. 1878S, 1879S, 1884, 1885, 1889 or 1891 Morgan Dollar, RD,49mm, brass [six pointed star each side] You Can Bet a Million// It’s The Best Buick Yet\\ [dot each side] When Better Automobiles Are Built// Buick Will Build Them. The 1878S and 1889 pieces sold on eBay were with the original business card that came with the piece from Ivan L. Wiles, Vice President, General Motors Corporation and General Manager Buick Motor Division, Flint, Michigan. Mr. Wiles’s card says on the reverse: “This will give you a good idea of what we think about the 1956 outlook. Ivan L. Wiles.” The 1878S sold for over \$200 with the card. The attribution to Flint is due to the card and because Flint was and is the corporate headquarters of the Buick Motor Division of the General Motors Corp. Buick Motor Division is listed as a branch of General Motors (Detroit) in Flint in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet. BS#43,1900 was described with the same words as on this piece, yet contained a 1974 Eisenhower dollar. If this is the same piece, and it looked like it from the picture, it is inconsistent with the 1956 date on the Wiles card.

Someone thought it was legitimate though, as it sold for \$77 plus a 10% buyer's fee. In the Heritage sale listed below, they state that this piece was "believed to have been sold or given away during the 1939-40 New York World's Fair." That is inconsistent with the information above, but may well apply to the General Motors pieces, like the -10 and -12 above, with the year 1940 on them. Even though I have seen this attributed as a Flint piece by many different sources (it is a pretty common piece), I still wanted to check it out. There is a Citizens Bank in Flint today. I called the bank to determine when the Citizens Bank was founded in Flint. Most of the employees there did not know; I guess they just could not remember that far back. After talking to about ten different people, I finally had the answer -- 1871. That matched the date on this encasement and is good enough evidence for me. This is a pretty common piece. Its name was indeed Dort Industrial Employees Federal Credit Union, until the 1980s. It was named after Dort Highway, which was the location of their primary Employee Group at AC Spark Plug. JeF, AJ \$5

[ ] (MI)-FLI/FEN-FI-10. 1964D, RD, 35mm. First Federal Savings and Loan Association// Flint/ & Fenton\ KMANGB. JL, LDe \$5

[ ] MI-FLI-FI-12. 1968D, RD, 35mm. - First Federal Savings -// 460 S. Saginaw - Flint, Mich.\ KMANGB. JL, EB, LDe, BS#46,70 (described as from Saginaw and Flint, but I think Bob just cataloged that one too quickly, missing the fact that the Saginaw was the street) \$4

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-FL-10. 1956D, H, holed at bottom. Flint Savings// Davison at [hole] Center Roads\ KMAYWHGL. This is the unusual reverse where there is no writing below the cent. N. Center Road and Davison Road are major thoroughfares that meet on the NE side of Flint. There is an obituary from the Flint Journal of February 26, 1932 of Reinhard Kleinpell on the Internet, which indicates he was the president of the former Flint Savings Association. JL \$10

You Get This in Change for a \$10.00 Bill With One of/ Hauger's \$9.99 Suits or Overcoats/ [in the circle above the cent] We Save You \$5.00 Every Time// [star each side, then still in the circle now below the cent] Come and See Values Tell/ 300 S. Saginaw St./ Flint, Mich. I have not seen the 1914 piece described in the LDe catalog to compare. LDe, EB \$75

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-HI-10. 1952D, H, holed at top. Irvin [hole] Hirsch/ Jeweler// 2006 Lewis St./ 3001 Corunna Rd.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 2006 Lewis is at the intersection with Broadway Blvd., just east of now I-475. 3001 Corunna Rd. is on the west side about 1/2 mile NE of the I-75 and I-69 intersection. Listed in BP's 1955 Dun & Bradstreet as having two jewelry, appliance stores in Flint. VN, LDe, EB \$10

[ ] (MI)-(FLI)-HI-12, holed at top. Irvin [hole] Hirsch/ Jewelers// "Three Great Stores to Serve you"\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unknown maverick when it came on for sale on eBay in March 2018. It is attributed on the same basis as the prior piece and it seems likely it came out just as Mr. Hirsch was opening his third store. EB \$10

[ ] MI-FLI-HO-10. 1901, SH. Home Steam Laundry, Flint, Mich.// Geo. H. Gordon/ Propr.\ KMANGB/ IBGL. One eBay piece had a replaced 1903 cent in it. LDe does not know what date the original cent is. Examine any examples of this piece with care for replaced cent! This has the type 3 squat horseshoe reverse (see MI-BCR-NA-10). EB (1901 likely original date); EB (one with 1903 cent, I think LS acquired this piece; a later one in September 2010 with 1898 cent, finally in April 2017 a nice one with 1901 cent), LDe \$50

[ ] MI-FLI-HU-10. 1978D, 1980 or 1980D, H. Souvenir of/ Huckleberry Railroad// Flint, Michigan\ KMANGB/ IBGL. The Flint River Railroad was founded in 1871 by the Flint and Pere Marquette Railroad (see MI-(DET)-PE-10). It was 23 miles long, going northeast out of Flint, serving Genesee, Rogersville, Otisville, Otter Lake & Fostoria. The train was supposedly nicknamed the Huckleberry Railroad because it ran so slowly that passengers would leave the train to pick huckleberries. The automobile cut substantially into the need for a small local train. Passenger service ended in 1925. In 1933, the last five miles of the route were eliminated and Otter Lake became the northeast end. In 1971, the railroad was abandoned and the Genesee County Parks and Recreation Commission made it into a living museum with an operating 1800s locomotive. The historical railroad is still running in 2000. The 1980 and 1980D pieces have the same dies; I haven't seen the 1978D to compare. LDe; JL; EB \$5

**Hamtramck** (an enclave of Detroit, on the near east side, just north of I-94. Very ethnically Polish)

Campau is Joseph Campau Street, the main north-south street through Hamtramck, named after an 18th century merchant and real estate promoter. Although Max's Jewelry store is no more, there are five jewelry stores on Jos. Campau St. today. LS, SH#15,888, LDe \$25

This was verified by BP when he found Werner Motor Sales listed in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet in the auto and boat repair business. Chrysler's headquarters were in Highland Park from 1925 to 1992, when Chrysler moved further north to Auburn Hills, Michigan, where its headquarters remain in 2009, after its bankruptcy and sale to Fiat. This piece is verified because the Uptown Radio Co. is still in business in 2000 at the same address, although its phone number has changed. Yahoo lists its place of business as Detroit, although this address is in Highland Park. EB, AM(828), LDe (attributed to Detroit) \$10

There is reference on the Internet in the history of the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis to Roy Young who became Governor of that reserve bank in 1919, coming from Citizens National Bank of Houghton Michigan. **Inkster** (the suburb directly west of Dearborn -- as per Henry Ford’s design, Dearborn was to be an all white city and Inkster all black. It is still mostly that way today, one unfortunate legacy of Henry Ford. The name is politically incorrect but hasn’t been changed)

**Iron Mountain** (Western part of the Upper Peninsula, just north of the Wisconsin border, about 85 miles north of Green Bay)

in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet, with \$247,000 of capital. My 1948D piece has the high relief lettering previously seen only on a small percentage of Chevy series pieces, for example, MI-DEA-MA-10, and on a 1948 nonChevy piece, the (MI)-LAN-AB-10. EB, DG#101,1327; JL, EB \$18

**Ishpeming** (western part of the Upper Peninsula, 15 miles W and a bit south of Marquette)

They look like die breaks. Then on some of the 1901 pieces and most of the mid 1900 pieces, the two lines become one solid line that looks like a major die break. This piece has the unnecessary line just under the cent and then a second solid line much lower, which I have not seen on any other piece. There were quite a few different reverse dies that made up the KMAAHM pieces, at least five, probably more. As the "Buggy" era was ending with the onslaught of the motorized automobile. I am sure that is not Brooklyn, New York, but instead a small town about 10 miles SE of Jackson. There is no longer a National Bank of Jackson operating in Jackson Michigan as of 2002. A Lexis legal case search shows that there was a very active First National Bank of Jackson and both a Consumer National Bank of Jackson and a Deposit Guaranty National Bank of Jackson in Mississippi, a People's National Bank of Jackson in Minnesota and a First National Bank of Jackson in Tennessee, Kentucky and Colorado. However, the only case for a National Bank of Jackson (the match for this piece) was a 1950 case in the Michigan Supreme Court for this bank in Jackson Michigan. The “Grosvenor Gambit” is an interesting play at bridge; it is technically a bad play that would allow the opponent to win when otherwise no win was possible, but the opponent is expected to fail to take advantage not thinking you are a fool, and so will thereafter be discouraged by your chutzpa. **Milan** (this city is not pronounced like its Italian counterpart -- its pronunciation has been Americanized to My'lun. It is a small city about 15 miles south of Ann Arbor on US 23, and is the home of a federal prison. There are signs on US 23 at Milan asking that no hitchhikers be picked up in the area.

This all reminds me of an interesting story that happened when I worked for Judge DeMascio back in the late 70s (see my comments on Detroit). We had a criminal case once where the defendant was in custody in the Milan facility -- probably because he could not make bail -- and so was brought in for the trial every morning by the U.S. Marshals.

One morning the Marshals were late bringing the defendant/prisoner in. The Judge was always very nervous when court started late. The jury came in and went to the jury room between 8:30 and 9:00; indeed, they had to be there by nine under penalty of contempt unless they had a very good excuse. The Judge did not want them thinking that they had to wait because he was unable to get to work on time, although in fact he was actually always in the office no later than 8:00. The proceedings could not begin until the defendant was present -- something about the U.S. Constitution.

When 9:30 came and still no defendant, the Judge had to do something to let the jury know the delay was not his fault. He never talked to a jury alone -- he always let the lawyers for the parties listen in behind the door. With everyone in place, he knocked on the door and when it opened told the jury, "We're going to be late this morning, the Marshals are late bringing the defendant in from Milan." Then he quickly shut the door, said "Oops," and told the defendant's

lawyer he would grant his motion for a mistrial. The jury is not allowed to know that the defendant is in custody. The Judge did not make many mistakes but when he did, he admitted them quickly and worked hard to correct them, as he had to here by starting the trial over again. Fortunately, this was only the second day of trial and not the second week.

Martin's Shoe House was still doing business at the same address in January 2000. LS \$10

Monroe Bank & Trust is still the largest bank in Monroe with eight locations. Although there are many Monroes in the country, I think this piece is verified to Monroe Michigan. Two different eBay sellers of the piece live quite close to Monroe Michigan and bought the piece near there. A google search in 2007 shows "Monroe Bank & Trust" as a bank in Monroe, Michigan, founded in 1868 as Dansard State Bank, then Dansard & Son Bank. In 1968, two years before this piece came out, the name was changed to the current Monroe Bank & Trust. BW sold a Wisconsin collection from Jessie Schlegel of Kansas on eBay in August 2007 and included this piece, attributed to Monroe Wisconsin. But that cannot be correct. In the 1960 D & B, two banks were listed under Monroe Wisconsin: Commercial & Savings Bank and First National Bank. There was a Monroe Bank & Trust in Monroe, N.C. in 1919, but I see no evidence of it in the 1960 D & B or currently on the Internet. JL, LDe \$4

According to the General Motors history section of its website, the Oakland Motor Co. was founded in Pontiac in 1907 by Edward M. Murphy. GM acquired a half interest in 1909 and then became 100% owner when Mr. Murphy died in 1910. Oakland Motor made the first “Pontiac” automobile in 1926, a six cylinder automobile called the “Chief of the Sixes.” In 1932, the Oakland Motor Co. changed its name to Pontiac. Thus, it appears that corporate headquarters of the Pontiac division of General Motors was always in Pontiac, at least through

1996. Pontiac Motor is listed in Pontiac as a division of the General Motors Corp. in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet. The DG piece came in the original white box which listed the distributor as Weyhing Bros. Mfg. Co., jewelers, 2040 Gratiot Ave., Detroit. **Redford** (suburb between Detroit and Livonia, first suburb west of Detroit on its northern half)

Thus, it seemed like this must be a Detroit area piece, but I could not find an intersection of Chicago Blvd. and Telegraph. Today, it is W. Chicago Road and not Chicago Blvd. that intersects with Telegraph in Redford. This east west road is called Chicago Blvd. in Detroit, but its name now changes in the suburbs. Phil verified that this drive-in was indeed at what is now the intersection of W. Chicago Rd. and Telegraph, between Plymouth and Joy Roads. He saw many a show there in his youth, when he lived off Middlebelt, between Chicago and Joy Road, until the theater was torn down in the late 60s or early 70s and a shopping mall put in. I called a gas station now on the corner of Telegraph and Chicago, and the attendant verified that this location is in Redford and that there once was a drive in movie theater on the corner. **Saginaw** (15 miles S of Saginaw Bay, county seat of Saginaw county, at the crook of the thumb, 80 miles N of Ann Arbor -- I thought it would be interesting to check into the origin of the name “Saginaw” as that name has been so often used -- Flint, Lansing and Pontiac have Saginaw streets. There apparently is some controversy, but both possibilities are pretty boring. The folklore is that the name came from the Sauk Indians, who supposedly once lived in this region before being driven off by other Indians. O-Sag-a-Nog supposedly means land of the Sauk in Sauk. A posting

on the Saginaw website claims that the Saulk actually never lived in this part of Michigan and that the true derivation of the name is from the Iroquois, sag-en-a, meaning “to flow from.” That certainly does not explain why the name is so often used in Michigan geography.)

There is no Brewster street in Saginaw Michigan today. Also, no other Saginaw piece lists a phone number, so that the unusual style of using no exchange cannot be verified. I used it to list all the gas stations near 8 Mile and Evergreen. It turns out that the even numbers on 8 Mile Road are in Southfield (i.e., on the north side of 8 mile) and the odd numbers in Detroit. So, despite the name, the Detroit Crane Co. was located in Southfield, and I will therefore catalog it here. Detroit Crane Co. was listed as a rental and repair company under Detroit in the 1953 Dun & Bradstreet, founded in 1945. There was no listing for Southfield. This is probably because Southfield did not vote to become a home rule city until 1955. It is listed in Southfield in the 1960 D & B, as a “rental” company. **St. Clair** (small town about at the midpoint of the St. Clair River, between Algonac and Port Huron)

**St. Clair Shores** (on lake St. Clair in Macomb county, just north of the imaginary line that would be Eight Mile Road if it extended on past I-94 and north of the five Grosse Pointe eastern suburbs that are in Wayne County)

The location was originally a Labidies Farm House, which then became Driscoll's Steak House. The name "Driscoll's" was on the roof. It then became Bobby Moore's Blind Fish restaurant, which burned down in 1997. In 1999, it was an empty field. LDe; JL, EB \$10

**St. Joseph** (right next to Benton Harbor, on Lake Michigan on I-94, as it turns southwest to follow the lake to Chicago)

**Stanton** (about 40 miles NE of Grand Rapids)

**Sturgis** (just across the Indiana border, about 30 miles S and a bit E of Kalamazoo. I remember playing in a couple of bridge tournaments here in the 70s when I was a student/bridge player at the University of Michigan)

However, I have used two separate numbers here to be consistent with Bryan Ryker's cataloging of these two pieces. BR \$6

According to Mr. Mishler, the purpose of the clock with nickel holder was to have the nickel available to put in a parking meter. Then, the clock hands could be moved to mark when the time expired, so that the owner had to return to his car. JB#13,80 \$50

This one has Real Estate & Loans below the cent, but then has address and city of 610 So. Clinton St., Fort Wayne. JL, LS, SH#16,743 \$8

**Taylor** (suburb of Detroit, S of Dearborn)

numbers) of Van Born is in Taylor and the north side is in Dearborn Heights. Omar Drive Ins Inc. is listed in the restaurant business in the 1960 D & B, under Taylor. JL \$10

[ ] MI-TAY-ZI-10. 1950D, H, holed at bottom. John Zittel's Covered Wagon Inn/ Good Food Choice Liquors// 12408 So. Telegraph Rd./ [to left in two lines] Taylor Center/ Mich. [hole between the two groupings] [to right in two lines] Phone/ WY. 4858 \ KMANGB/ IBGL. The city that has 12408 S. Telegraph Road in it is Taylor. The high school was once called Taylor Center high and there is an indication on Yahoo that there was a "Taylor Center." I called the Taylor city hall and the city was always, "Taylor." JL, EB, JR, LDe, OR(830) \$12

[ ] (MI)-TAY-ZI-12. 1956D, H, holed at bottom. John Zittel/ The Covered Wagon Inn// Taylor Center/ Phone [hole] WH 1-1300\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. Different obverse and reverse dies as evident from the words. JL \$12

### **Tecumseh** (about 25 miles S and a bit W of Ann Arbor)

**Trenton** (suburb S of Detroit on the Detroit River just across from Grosse Ile)

[ ] MI-TRE-NA-10. 1959D, RD,32mm. Pro-Tek-Tiv Shoes// Fred Navarre Shoes/ 223 West Road/ Trenton, Michigan\\ KMANGB. Another in the Pro Tek Tiv shoe series. The others from Michigan are MI-BIR-HA-10 and MI-DET-JE-20 and -22. There are also four pieces from the series cataloged in my New York Encased Catalog and another four in Ohio. JL, EB, VN, LDe, PCu \$8

**Unionville** (in the thumb, just off the water near the E side of Saginaw Bay, about 30 miles NE of Saginaw)

I found two references on the Internet to this company. One, a 1965 story in the American Metal Market magazine, quoted Allan Tann, president of the American Products Welding Corp., and in the story it mentioned that he bought this Warren company in 1968 when it had 4 employees and grew it into a company that had 140. Then there was a 1982 legal case about workers’ compensation, where it was noted that this was a Michigan corporation, with Allan Tann president. JL \$4

**Warren** (large eastern suburb just north of Detroit, bordered on the south by Eight Mile Road and on the North by Fourteen Mile Road, the third suburb east of Lake St. Clair -- St. Clair Shores is on the lake and then Eastpointe (formerly East Detroit) and Roseville lie between St. Clair Shores and Warren)

see Detroit for (MI)-(DET)/(WAR)-FB-10 and -12.

[ ] MI-WAR-HO-12. 1960D large and 1962D. Ray Holmes// 22527 Van Dyke Ave./ Warren, Mich.\ KMANGB. This piece which also used 1960D cents, corrected the mistake. BR was only aware of the 1962D when he published his TAMS article in 1995, I found the 1960D version later. The two dates were made by the same dies. JL; BR, JL \$3

Holmes moved to Nine Mile (the east-west road nine miles north of downtown Detroit) by the time this piece was made. He did not move far; half a mile north on Van Dyke and about a quarter mile west on Nine Mile. BR, JL \$3

[ ] (MI)-(WAR)-RI-10. 1946, H, holed at bottom. Jos. Rivard/ Appliance - Sport Shop// 21045 Van Dyke/ Phone [hole] Plaza 1545\ KMANGB/ IBGL. 21045 Van Dyke is in Warren, just north of 8 Mile Road, between **Rivard** Ave. and Jackson Ave. Rivard Ave. is the first street north of 8 Mile. Plaza is listed on the phone exchange website as a Detroit exchange. BP found Jos. Rivard Hardware listed in the 1942 Detroit phone book at 20911 Van Dyke, phone Slocumb 2277. It either moved a short distance between 1942 and the time when this piece came out or it opened a second store north of Eight Mile. JL, MS, BP, LDe (attributed to Detroit) \$10

[ ] (MI)-(WAR)-RI-12. 1946, H, holed at top. Same words as on the -10, but a different obverse die as here there is extra room between Jos. and Rivard for the hole at top and no room between Phone and Plaza 1545 for a hole at the bottom. Different reverse die as well -- here the I Bring is very small and the Good and Luck are more vertical than horizontal. The -10 has the more normal larger I Bring and the more horizontal Good Luck. JL, EB \$10

There are a number of references to this credit union in Macomb county on the Internet. That led me to find the credit union listed on Yahoo, still in business at two addresses in Warren in 2001. LDe attributed to Kalamazoo and Warren. JL, AM(213), LDe, AA#8,m-57 \$7

[ ] (MI)-(WAR)-VA-10. 1955D, H, holed at top. Van Dyke [hole] Clothiers/ Van Dyke at 9 Mi.// Men's & Boys' Wear/ Tux Rentals\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. Nine Mile and Van Dyke is indeed in Warren, near both of Ray Holmes's locations. EB, LDe \$8

[ ] MI-WAR-WA-10. 1970D, H. Warren Coin Club/ Michigan// The Future is Youth/ Oct. 70\\ KMAHGL/ IBGL. JL, EB, LS, JR, LDe \$3

[ ] MI-WAR-WA-12. 1972D, H. Warren Coin Club/ Michigan// Our Tenth Anniversary/ Feb. 1972\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. JL, LS, RT, LDe \$3

[ ] MI-WAR-WA-14. 1972D, RD,35mm. Warren Coin Club/ Mich.// Tenth Anniversary/ Coin Show 1972\\ KMANGB. The club made both a horseshoe and a round for this occasion. JL, EB, LS, LDe, PCu \$3

**Wayland** (small town midway between Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo, on the west side of Gun Lake)

Gun Lake sounds like a remote hunting and fishing area - - but it is not remote at all. This piece does not reference a town, only the lake itself. Based on my decision that all pieces must be located to some town or city, if at all possible, I undertook to determine what town Joe's Grocery was in. Another piece that posed similar problems is the oval 1948S Tubby's Shavehead Lake piece (see Cassopolis).

The Internet was a big help. One of the local residents has a Gun Lake website and I emailed her. She and I struck up an interesting email conversation. It turns out that the north side of the lake is Middleville, the west side Wayland, the south Shelbyville, Martin and Orangeville and the east side Delton. So, where was Joe's Grocery and the Tower back in 1961?

It was, as you can guess from this listing, on the west side in Wayland. Sheryl, the Gun Lake resident, reports that the tower is the TV 3 tower, which is so large that boaters on the

lake use it for bearings at night. Joe's sold fresh meat, ice, beer, pop, ice cream, gas and souvenirs. The grocery was an old school house originally, but has been torn down. Joe's son now runs a gas station and auto parts store in the Wayland part of Gun Lake. JL, LS, EB, SA#9,451 \$7

In fact, according to expedia, only Eaton, Colorado has a 35306 Main Street. However, BP did find Gates Shell Service listed as a service station in his 1955 Dun & Bradstreet, in Wayne, Michigan and none in Eaton Colorado. Perhaps the 35306 address is incorrect? LDe \$10

[ ] MI-WAY-HA-10. 1949D, H, holed at bottom. The Harrisons Inc./ Ford// Wayne, Mich./ LO. 2- [hole] 9500\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. This was an unlisted Michigan piece when I bought it on eBay as part of a 20 piece lot in September 2012. JL \$12

**Wyandotte** (SW suburb of Detroit, on the Detroit River, near the northern tip of Grosse Ile)

I called the Wyandotte public library who took a look at the 1947 and 1950 Wyandotte directories. In 1947, Steffan Bielawski had a "Biergarten" at 2000 Biddle. In 1950, Chester and Frank Frederick were the owners of the "Biergarten." JL \$25

[ ] (MI)-(WYA)-JA-10. 1948, H, holed at bottom. Jack & Phil's Service/ AAA Service 24 Hrs. Towing// WY. [hole] 9613\\ KMANGB/ IBGL. I bought this from the same Michigan seller, along with the two Phil & Red's Service pieces ((MI)-(WYA)-PH-10 and -12) and the keychain for Phil's Sunoco Service described below. Although I have not found this establishment in a directory, I am going to consider this piece verified to Wyandotte, based on the WY. phone number and Phil, in particularly the similarity of the name to the verified Phil & Red's pieces. It would appear that Phil was in the service station business in Wyandotte with Jack until 1949, when he teamed up with Red. JL \$10

Verified by a plastic keychain piece sold to me at the same time I bought this piece, which says: "Phil's/ Sunoco Service/ Biddle Cor. Orchard/ Wyandotte, Mich./ Phone: WY. 9428." 3804 Biddle is indeed at the corner of Orchard in Wyandotte. This is ACE Maverick No. 50. In 2002, Fairbanks Morse Engine was a division of Goodrich (itself located in Charlotte, North Carolina) and was based in Beloit, Wisconsin. It was founded in the 1870s and made the first commercially successful gasoline engine (Charles Morse inventor) in 1893 and also the Eclipse Windmill. I contacted the division in Beloit and spoke with June Card, who told me that although the engine division and the windmill production was always in Beloit, corporate headquarters of the Fairbanks Morse Co. were in Chicago from 1871 (shortly after the Chicago fire) until the 1960s when the company was sold. She said that this was as long as the Morse brothers owned the company. My guess is that the Morse brothers preferred to live in Chicago rather than in Beloit. The scales mentioned in this piece were manufactured in St. Johnsbury Vermont. I believe that LDe may have attributed this to Detroit because the Fairbanks Morse Co. was acquired by Colt Industries in the 1960s and Colt Industries Operating Corp. had some Detroit ties.

LS and LDe attributed this to Detroit and Frank & Seder did indeed have a store in Detroit, but I believe Pittsburgh is the most likely attribution. As I read this piece, the children's department was on the sixth floor of the department store. I do not know whether that was in the Pittsburgh, Philadelphia or Detroit store, but until I do, I believe Pittsburgh, company headquarters, is the best attribution for this piece. LS notes that the Detroit store was located at 1413-1447 Woodward Ave. in 1927 and claimed to be the largest apparel store in Michigan, dealing in women's, children's and boys' apparel of all kinds.

LDe and an eBay seller in July 2007 attributed this to Detroit, and I thought it likely until I got the 1955 Detroit yellow pages and it was not listed as a credit union there; there was a St. Jude Parish Federal Credit Union listed. There are plenty of other St. Philomena churches in the country. EB, LDe \$6

An eBay seller in 2019 attributed this to Detroit, but from what I can find, Sunny Service Oil Co. was organized in Detroit in 1928, but changed its name to "Joy Oil" in 1938, well before this piece came out. A one dollar certificate sold in a 2007 auction "Good for Gasoline and Oil at all Sunny Service Oil Co. stations," Detroit, Mich., but it was attributed to the "depression era." I found a Sunny Service Oil Co. station in Perrysburg Ohio in the 2000s, but I couldn't find how far back it went.

This is a Fankhauser piece, cataloged as XX-XXX-BA-10 by Bryan Ryker. LDe attributed it to Dearborn, but I called the Dearborn historical society and a very nice lady checked all directories from 1958 to 1972 (this has a 1962D cent) and found nothing in the individual or personal section for any T. Bass. DF found TK Bass listed under real estate in South Gate in the 1955 Los Angeles phone directory. He had phone no. LO 8-6716, with the same last four digits as on this piece. Perhaps the exchange changed between 1955 and 1962 when this piece was made.

There have been several attributions of this piece to Ypsilanti, Michigan, but that is not correct, the piece was from Chicago. "Trojan Lndry & Clnrs" is listed at 2834 Bway, phone LAkw 5-1881 in my 1952 Chicago directory. As the phone number is an exact match, that makes the piece verified to Chicago. The Ypsilanti phone exchange was HU. I called the Ypsilanti public library who found "Trojan Laundry & Cleaners" in the 1958 Ypsilanti phone directory with two phone numbers: HU 2-8530 and HU 2-5280. So although Ypsilanti had a Trojan Laundry & Cleaners, it was not the company that issued this piece.

This piece was delisted as a Michigan piece when LS reported that there is no boiler or boiler manufacturer company listed under Dearborn, Michigan in his 1901 Michigan Gazetteer

(the only boiler compound companies listed are Early & Burns in Hastings and Magoon & Kimball from Muskegon). The only reference I could find on the Internet to Dearborn Boiler Compounds was that they also advertised on Stanley rulers. This was attributed by Kurt Krueger in his Michael Kolman sale to Dearborn, Michigan, but probably based only on the name.

LS speculated that it might be from Chicago, probably because of the downtown street, Dearborn. And it was eventually found there, but not on Dearborn Street. An advertisement from the April-Sept. 1902 issue of The Engineering Magazine and Industrial Review listed: "Foaming stopped and dry steam delivered by using 'Dearbron Boiler Compounts.' Dearbron Drug & Chemical Works, 27-31 Rialto Bldg., Chicago, Wm. Edgar President." Here are the references: JL, EB, KK193, BS#46,24, BS#40,79 \$50

LDe attributed this to Detroit, and although Adams is a Detroit exchange, it became Adams 1 with the Detroit changeover to seven digits in 1948. Therefore, I never thought this 1952 piece could be correct to Detroit (if it were Detroit, the business would have had 7 digits by 1950 in any event). Subsequently, it was found in the Osborne orders as a Toledo, Ohio company (OR 2015).

Wilbert Burial Vaults (IL)-(BRO)-WI-10

Wilbert, Inc. and Wilbert Funeral Services, Inc. developed and own the rights to the Wilbert Burial Vault name. The company was originally founded by Leo Haase in 1880 as L.G. Haase Manufacturing Co. and then started making concrete burial vaults. It was called the Wilbert W. Haase Co. from 1903 to 1967. They have licensed this name to over 300 franchisees nationwide. This includes the Wilbert Burial Vault Co. located in Battle Creek, Michigan. Thus, LDe attributed the Wilbert pieces to Battle Creek, but he found one of the 300 franchisees, not the parent company. The ACE maverick program originally attributed the piece to Duluth, Minnesota, but that found another of the many franchisees. The company is still in business in 2002 and has a web site. I emailed them, and they verified that the parent corporation has always been located in the "Windy City," and after another question, specifically in the Chicago suburb of Broadview, Illinois.
